Investment Objective

Capital growth from investing in US smaller companies.



Investment Policy

The portfolio is a product of the investment team's bottom-up investment approach and disciplined portfolio construction.

The investment philosophy is simple and straightforward: to invest in companies that have a financially sustainable competitive advantage, that are run by competent management teams who have a track record of success and are good stewards of capital, and to focus on owning equity stakes in businesses that trade at a discount to their intrinsic value.



Investment team

The investment team is situated in New York. The lead portfolio manager, Don San Jose, has managed the portfolio since November 2008. The co-managers, Dan Percella and Jon Brachle, were appointed in 2014 and 2017 respectively. They are supported by additional investment professionals dedicated to researching US smaller companies, as well as the wider JPMAM investment management team.



Benchmark Index

The Russell 2000 Index total return with net dividends reinvested, expressed in sterling terms ('the Benchmark'). This index is a smaller companies' index and is rebalanced annually to represent the smallest two thousand stocks by market capitalisation of all companies quoted in the Russell 3000 Index. Comparison of the Company's performance is made with this benchmark.



Capital Structure

At 31st December 2024, the Company's share capital comprised 65,406,275 ordinary shares of 2.5p each including 4,784,011 shares held in Treasury. Since the year end, a further 369,510 shares have been repurchased into Treasury.



Continuation Vote

In accordance with the Company's Articles of Association, the Directors are required to propose a resolution that the Company continue as an investment trust at the forthcoming Annual General Meeting in June 2025 and every fifth year thereafter.



Management Company and Company Secretary

The Company employs JPMorgan Funds Limited (JPMF or the Manager) as its Alternative Investment Fund Manager (AIFM) and Company Secretary. JPMF delegates the management of the Company's portfolio to JPMorgan Asset Management (UK) Limited (JPMAM). All of these entities are wholly owned subsidiaries of J.P. Morgan Chase & Co. The investment team, Don San Jose, Jon Brachle and Dan Percella (the 'Portfolio Managers') manage the Company's portfolio on behalf of the Investment Manager.

The Company is a member of the AIC.

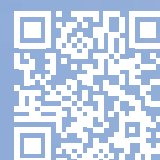

Our heritage and our team

The JPMorgan US Smaller Companies Investment Trust plc (“the Company”) has a long-term track record and a disciplined process in US small-cap investing. The Company is managed by a tight knit team with a focus on delivering alpha. The portfolio manager of the Company is Don San Jose, who has 28 years’ experience and has been managing the Company since 2008. He is assisted in the management of the Company by co-portfolio managers Dan Percella and Jon Brachle. The portfolio managers have research responsibilities for the Company. They are also supported by Chris Carter and Jesse Huang, who are dedicated to researching US smaller companies. The investment team has an average of 19 years’ experience. The experience and longevity of the investment team serve as a significant competitive advantage. In addition, the investment team can leverage the vast resources at JPMAM which include over 40 US equity analysts and over 200 research analysts globally.

Our proven investment approach

Don San Jose and the team are bottom-up managers and select stocks based on company fundamentals and proprietary fundamental analysis to construct portfolios. It is through independent research focused on high quality stocks, together with a disciplined approach to valuation that the team aims to add value for investors over the long term. The team exercises a fundamental approach to investing in companies with emphasis on durable business models, quality management, consistent earnings, high return on invested capital and sustainable free cash flow. The fundamental components of the investment philosophy have remained consistent since the team began managing US small cap assets. However, the investment approach has evolved considerably in recent years as they have expanded coverage and made use of additional resources, including the integration of ESG metrics into the investment process and the enhanced use of technological tools.

Chair's Statement

Dear Shareholders, I have great pleasure in presenting the Annual Report of JPMorgan US Smaller Companies Investment Trust plc ('the Company') for the year ended 31st December 2024. The year was notable in many ways: continued strong performance from US equity markets, fuelled primarily by a handful of large capitalisation technology stocks; the US Presidential election seeing Donald Trump secure a second term in the White House; and, closer to home, a sustained period of significantly widened discounts leading to record levels of investment trust M&A activity alongside the arrival of vocal activist investors on share registers across the sector.

Performance

US equity markets began 2024 on a strong note, fuelled by optimism surrounding a 'soft landing' for the economy. Positive economic news, strong consumption, solid corporate earnings and Federal Reserve interest rate cuts provided further support to stock market performance. Latterly, the 2024 US elections had a significant impact on the markets on the expectation of tax cuts and pro-growth policies with particular support for domestically-oriented businesses. The initial euphoria rapidly faded as initial policy targets of tariffs, tougher action in immigration and a shift in US foreign policy were seen as less growth-positive and introduced significant uncertainties.

Against this backdrop, the Company's total return on net assets over the year was +11.3% which is modestly behind the +13.3% return for the benchmark, the Russell 2000 index in sterling terms. Total return to shareholders was +18.7% for the year, with the discount at which the Company's shares traded over the 12 month period narrowing.

While the Company's absolute total return performance was strong, the performance relative to the benchmark over the short term is disappointing. Your investment team focuses on investment in more profitable, higher-quality and less volatile small cap businesses which, while defensive in weaker markets, can lag in markets that exhibit a preference for lower-quality growth stocks. Importantly, the longer-term track record of benchmark outperformance remains intact. This reflects the Manager's disciplined focus on investment in high-quality, investment opportunities at attractive valuations.

Discount Management, Share Issuance and Buybacks

As I noted in our 2024 Interim Report, there has been a growing presence of activist investors on share registers across the sector. For example, US firm SABA Capital Management recently requisitioned meetings at seven trusts in which it had accumulated significant shareholdings; ostensibly to realise the value locked inside persistent share price discounts to net asset value (NAV), but the underlying rationale was widely perceived to be a self-interested attempt to gather assets in a way that failed to protect shareholder interests. The boards and managers of the trusts involved overcame the long standing challenges of communicating with individual shareholders to ensure that they were made aware of the implications of the proposals and encouraged to vote. In each case the resolutions were voted down on strong turnout. While these actions have shaken the sector, there are certainly significant positives to emerge. For example, the rejection of the proposals indicates that shareholders value the unique attributes of investment trusts – most notably an independent board representing the rights of all shareholders. It has reminded all boards that persistent discounts must be proactively addressed. Finally, it has provoked stronger engagement with government and regulators to improve boards' abilities to engage directly with shareholders. This must include individuals who hold their shares through platforms.

I would like to reassure shareholders that your Board continues to take a proactive rather than reactive approach to such issues, as we always have done, to protect and grow your interests as shareholders.

On a day-to-day basis this aim is best served by transacting in your Company's shares when appropriate, aiming to minimise the discrepancy between the share price and the net asset value. Our ability to do so depends on prevailing market conditions and the behaviour and risk appetite of investors. Additional challenges include US smaller companies' share price volatility and owning dollar-denominated assets whilst reporting in sterling. We only transact in your Company's shares

when it will enhance shareholder value – buying back stock at a discount to NAV to remove excess supply of the Company's shares from the market, and issuing at a share price above NAV to avoid the formation of an excessive premium.

With the shares trading at a discount throughout 2024 our primary focus was on stimulating demand for your Company's shares. To this end, we have two key levers at our disposal: an active, value-enhancing share buyback programme, and effective ongoing marketing activities. We have continued to be busy on both fronts.

During the year to 31st December 2024, the Company bought back 3,047,895 shares into Treasury, at an average price of 399.0p and a total cost of £12.2 million, in periods when discounts were particularly wide, reflected in the weighted average discount of 11.5% at which these shares were acquired. Since the year end, the Company has repurchased an additional 369,510 shares into Treasury. The Company did not issue any shares during the year or since the year-end.

On marketing activities, we continue to improve the promotion of your Company to shareholders and the broader market. For example, the Board has recently engaged an adviser to support the Manager in promoting the attractive characteristics of the Company. Their primary focus is to maximise the impact of the compelling content generated by the investment team under the evergreen tagline 'Invest in the Heart of America.' To improve access to this content the Company's website has been upgraded and we would strongly recommend it as the primary source of information on the Company. The Board continues to work actively on improving the Company's shareholder communications and PR programme.

I am pleased to report that these actions, alongside the emerging recognition of the appeal of attractively-valued, domestically-oriented, high-quality US small cap stocks in a falling rate environment, mean that your Company's discount, which averaged 8.9% over the course of the year, ending the year at a narrower discount of 1.8% (2023: 7.9%), although it has since widened to 6.5% as I write.

Continuation of the Company

In accordance with the Company's Articles of Association, an ordinary resolution will be put to shareholders at the forthcoming AGM that the Company continues in existence as an investment trust for a further five-year period.

The Board believes strongly in the case for long-term investment in US smaller companies through an investment trust. US small cap investments are a highly appealing proposition, offering access to a large and diverse opportunity set of exciting and entrepreneurial companies geared to the US economy. Further, current valuations lead us to expect strong performance from small caps over the next few years. The Company provides access to this attractive sector that individual investors and many institutions would find difficult to replicate. The investment trust structure is highly appropriate for investment in this sector, offering stable capital for investment in a less liquid sector, alongside the ability to borrow to enhance investment returns. Finally, the US small cap investment team at JP Morgan have a proven long-term track record of managing your Company through the consistent application of their proven philosophy and process. Over the 10 years to 31st December 2024, the total return from the Company's net assets was +187.1%, significantly outperforming its benchmark which returned +158.9% over the same period.

During the last 12 months, the Board, via the Management Engagement Committee, has undertaken a detailed review of the Manager and its investment approach. While acknowledging that relative performance over shorter term periods has been disappointing, the Board believes that the Manager's approach continues to be appropriate for the Company and that JPMorgan Asset Management has the appropriate resources to continue to manage the Company successfully. Additionally, the Company's major shareholders have been consulted where practicable, with feedback from this process indicating strong support for the continuation resolution.

Accordingly, the Board believes that the continuation of the Company is in the best interests of all shareholders and strongly recommends that shareholders vote in favour of the resolution at the AGM in June 2025, as the Directors intend to do in respect of their own holdings.

Revenue and Dividend

The Board is delighted to recommend a dividend of 3.1p in respect of the financial year ended 31st December 2024 (2023: 3.0p). Subject to shareholders' approval at the Annual General Meeting (AGM), this dividend will be paid on 11th July 2025 to shareholders on the register at the close of business on 13th June 2025. The ex dividend date is 12th June 2025.

The Company's objective is unchanged and remains one of capital growth. The dividend distribution amount will normally be driven by the minimum dividend required to maintain the Company's investment trust status. Therefore, the dividend level may fluctuate as the distributions typically reflect the naturally occurring income on the underlying portfolio.

Gearing

Our policy sees gearing levels adjusted to reflect changes in the Board's expectations for longer-term opportunities and market risks (with input from the Manager), rather than being used as a short-term market-timing tool.

At the beginning of the year the Company had a US\$30 million (with an option to draw a further US\$10 million) revolving credit facility with Scotiabank to maintain a meaningful but modest level of gearing. On 15th March 2024 the Board renewed the facility with Scotiabank, the new facility being a secured 364-day facility for a reduced amount of US\$20 million (with a US\$10 million accordion option). In November 2024 the Board elected to utilise the full accordion US\$10 million facility noting the attraction of small cap valuations relative to large caps. The Board renewed the loan facility in March 2025 with a new loan provider, Bank of America. This is now for US\$35 million (with a US\$5 million accordion option) and is a 360 day evergreen facility.

As at 31st December 2024, the Company had drawn down US\$30 million (GBP 24.0 million). It closed the year with a gearing level of 7.7%. The Board believes that the use of gearing is a key advantage of the investment trust structure and has consistently used gearing over time within its permitted 5% cash to 15% geared range.

Board and Succession Planning

In January 2025 the Board, through its Nomination Committee, carried out a comprehensive evaluation of the Board, its Committees, the individual Directors and the Chair. Topics discussed included the size and composition of the Board, Board information and processes, shareholder engagement, and training and accountability. The resulting report demonstrated the Board is working effectively for shareholders and in line with expectations. It was agreed that all the Directors will offer themselves for re-appointment at the forthcoming AGM and I very much hope you will vote for their re-appointment.

The Board has set in place detailed succession plans. These are particularly important for a board of four directors to ensure no discontinuity is caused by the retirement of non-executive directors after nine years' service, according to our policy, and as recommended by the AIC Code of Corporate Governance. Shefaly Yogendra will retire from the Board at the AGM in 2026. We are in the process of appointing an external adviser to assist in recruiting a new Director, with the intention to complete the process in the latter half of 2025.

Board Diversity

The Board recognises the value and importance of diversity in the boardroom. I am pleased to report that the Board meets the FCA Listing Rules targets on gender diversity criteria, female representation in a senior role and ethnic representation on the Board.

Review of services provided by the Manager

During the year, the Board, through its Management Engagement Committee, carried out a thorough review of the investment management, secretarial and marketing services provided to the Company by the Manager. Following this review, the Board has concluded that the continued appointment of the Manager on the terms agreed is in the interests of the shareholders.

The Company's ongoing charges for the financial year as a percentage of the average of the daily net assets during the year, which include the management fee¹, gearing costs and other expenses, were 0.92% (2023: 0.93%).

Environment, Social and Governance (ESG) considerations

The Board continues to engage with the Manager on the integration of ESG factors into its investment process. The Board is satisfied that the Manager has a robust and well-resourced approach, and that ESG factors are considered by the Portfolio Managers throughout the investment process.

The Board shares the Manager's view of the importance of financially material ESG factors when making investments for the long term and, in particular, the necessity of continued engagement throughout the duration of investment. The Portfolio Managers' ESG report describes the developments in the ESG process that have taken place during the year together with practical examples of how these are implemented.

Annual General Meeting

We are inviting shareholders to join us in person for the Company's sixty-eighth AGM to be held on Tuesday 17th June 2025 at 2.30 p.m. at 60 Victoria Embankment, London EC4Y 0JP. The Board hopes to welcome as many shareholders as possible.

As with previous years, you will have the opportunity to hear from the Portfolio Managers. Their presentation will be followed by a question and answer session. There will be refreshments afterwards when shareholders will be able to meet members of the Board. Shareholders wishing to follow the AGM proceedings but choosing not to attend in person will be able to do so online, and will be able to ask questions through conferencing software. Details on how to register together with access details can be found on the Company's website: www.jpmsmallercompanies.co.uk, or by contacting the Company Secretary at jpmam.investment.trusts@jpmorgan.com.

In accordance with normal practice, all voting on the resolutions will be conducted on a poll. Due to technological reasons, shareholders viewing the meeting via conferencing software will not be able to vote on the poll and we therefore encourage all shareholders, and particularly those who cannot attend physically, to submit their proxy votes in advance of the meeting, so that they are registered and recorded at the AGM. Proxy votes can be lodged in advance of the AGM either by post or electronically. Detailed instructions are included in the Notes to the Notice of Annual General Meeting in the Annual Report. Please ensure that you act promptly on the notifications for voting, or consider contacting your share platform or wealth manager by their stipulated deadline to ensure that your votes are submitted on time. In addition, shareholders are encouraged to send any questions ahead of the AGM to the Board via the Company Secretary at the email address above. We will endeavour to answer relevant questions at the meeting or via the website depending on arrangements in place at the time.

If there are any changes to the above AGM arrangements, the Company will update shareholders through its website and, as appropriate, through an announcement on the London Stock Exchange.

My fellow Board members, representatives of JPMorgan and I look forward to the opportunity to meet and speak with shareholders after the formalities of the meeting have been concluded.

Outlook

The Board continues to have high confidence in the investment team, and their investment philosophy and process which have been applied consistently to generate strong long-term returns for the Company. The political and economic backdrop is continuing to develop under the new administration as the old order is replaced with a revised political agenda, and a different way of running government and interacting with the rest of the world. While this introduces significant uncertainty, the new administration under Donald Trump has committed to supporting growth in the domestic economy, albeit early actions do not directly support this stated intention. We are confident that the investment team continues to focus their investment decisions on valuation-conscious, all-weather stocks that will be robust in the face of political and economic developments. With the relative valuation of small cap investments so attractive, and the US small cap bias towards the home market, we believe that as the domestic-growth oriented policies are implemented those that Invest in the Heart of America through your Company will benefit from strong investment returns over time.

Market Review

In 2024, the US economy and financial markets experienced another robust year. The S&P 500 Index achieved a second year of double-digit returns, posting an impressive return of more than 25% in US dollars and more than 27% in sterling. This remarkable growth was underpinned by resilient consumer spending and marked the fourth consecutive year of above-trend economic expansion.

US equity markets began 2024 on a strong note, fuelled by optimism that the economy would achieve a 'soft landing'. Initially, economists projected modest growth of only 1.2% growth for the year. However, GDP growth came in above expectations, with real GDP growth for the US increasing by 2.8% year-on-year in 2024. Consumption, which constitutes almost 70% of nominal GDP, has been especially resilient. Year-over-year, real consumer spending rose by 2% for goods, while durable goods and services both increased by 3%.

Throughout the year, the job market and interest rates remained central topics of discussion. Despite some concerns about an economic slowdown, employment has grown for 48 consecutive months and the unemployment rate concluded the year at 4.1%, only slightly higher than where it started, at 3.8%. Inflation made significant progress towards the Federal Reserve's 2% target, which allowed it to begin cutting interest rates. Federal policy has been targetting lower inflation since March 2022, when rates began increasing to slow the economy, and by August 2023 the benchmark rate reached its highest level in 23 years. As inflation moderated, rates were cut by 0.5 percentage points in September 2024, followed by two additional cuts, each of 0.25 percentage points. By year-end, the federal funds rate stood in a range of 4.25% to 4.5%.

The US Presidential election also had a significant impact on the markets, which experienced substantial gains following the results. This was largely driven by expectations that the new administration would implement tax cuts and other pro-growth policies. Furthermore, US Corporate earnings also boosted the market's performance, once again surpassing expectations. Earnings forecasts for 2024 rose steadily due to the supportive macroeconomic environment. Current projections indicate earnings growth of 12% year-on-year for 2024, notably higher than the ten-year average growth rate of 8%.

Within the small cap space, the market environment over the past year favoured more growth-oriented investments. The Russell 2000 Index posted an 11.5% gain in US Dollars and 13.3% in Sterling in 2024. While this performance lagged that of larger-cap peers, it matched the index's historical annualised return since 1978. Within the Russell 2000 index, all sectors except energy posted positive returns. Telecoms, Technology and Consumer Staples were the best performing sectors, while Energy, Health Care and Basic Materials were the worst performers.

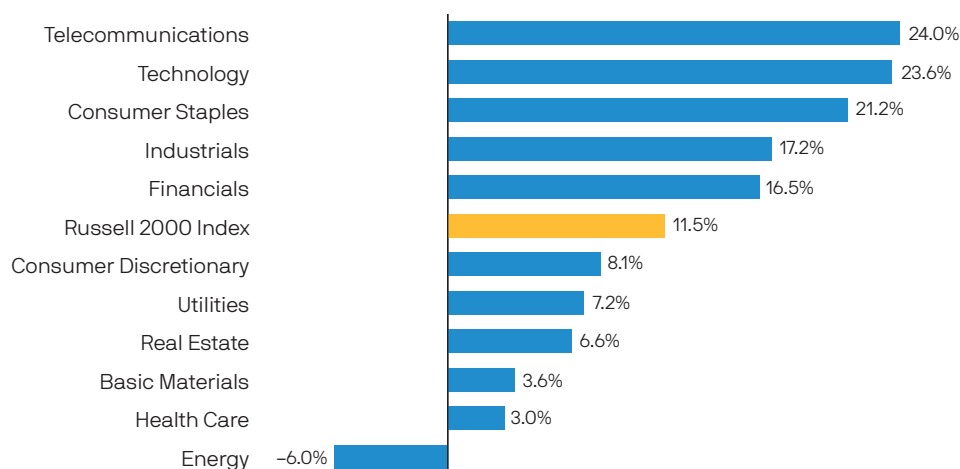

Performance

Against this background, the Company's net asset value total return increased by +11.3 % in 2024, underperforming its benchmark, the Russell 2000 Index (Net) total return, which rose by +13.3% in sterling terms. Our portfolio seeks to invest in high quality companies at a reasonable valuation, and maintained a pro-cyclical tilt throughout the year. This focus on quality, however, was a headwind in a market that favoured growth-oriented and higher-momentum stocks.

Within the portfolio, we owned a number of securities which performed well, particularly in areas like Financials, Consumer Staples and Energy, where stock selection was positive. Throughout the year, and particularly in the fourth quarter (Q4), however, our portfolio faced challenges driven by heightened investor enthusiasm for technology stocks, particularly in themes like Artificial Intelligence (AI), quantum computing, and space, which make up a smaller proportion of our portfolio. Additionally, the increase in 10-year Treasury yields by 80 basis points during Q4 created further headwinds for some of our Industrial holdings. Although overall index returns were reasonable, factor performance was decidedly risk-on, with low returns on equity, non-earners, volatility, and momentum leading, which was a headwind for our quality-oriented style.

With regards to relative performance over the past year, our stock selection in the financials and consumer staples sectors contributed positively to performance. Within Financials, our overweight position in **Stepstone Group** and exposure to **Evercore** added to the Company's performance. Stepstone Group is a global private markets firm which manages investments in private equity, real estate, infrastructure, and private debt. Shares outperformed on account of solid financial results, significant fundraising achievements, and growth in fee-related earnings and margins. The company saw increases in private wealth assets under management and undeployed fee-earning capital. Additionally, the buyout of remaining stakes in its infrastructure, private debt, and real estate businesses positively impacted the stock. We believe Stepstone Group remains well-positioned to capitalise on the secular growth in private markets, and this underpins our ongoing conviction in the stock. Evercore, a provider of investment banking advisory services for mergers and acquisitions, performed strongly, fuelled by solid earnings, robust advisory revenues, and an anticipated recovery in capital markets. Strategic investments in talent, combined with market share gains in large deals also boosted investor confidence. While we still like the company, we are actively monitoring our holding on account of its recent outperformance and investors' high expectations from the stock.

Elsewhere, our exposure to **DT Midstream** (DTM) proved beneficial. This company provides natural gas transportation and storage services. The stock rose due to consistent profit growth and strategic expansions, including key project completions and pipeline acquisitions. The company's robust project backlog and increased demand for natural gas added to positive investor sentiment. We continue to view DTM as a quality, defensive energy company, and we remain comfortable with our holding.

On the other hand, our stock selection in the Industrials and Technology sectors detracted the most. Within Industrials, our overweight position in **Janus International** and exposure to **Willscot** hurt performance. Janus International manufactures and supplies turn-key self-storage and commercial and industrial building solutions. The stock underperformed due to declining revenues and earnings, driven by reduced volumes and pricing, particularly in the self-storage and commercial segments. Despite some growth in new construction, the company's overall financial performance was hampered by project delays and macroeconomic uncertainties. However, we remain confident in the longer-term prospects for the business, as the current challenges are macroeconomic in nature, rather than company specific. Willscot is the largest provider of modular office space and portable storage solutions. Shares declined due to volume weakness and macroeconomic challenges, including weak non-residential construction activity. The termination of the previously announced McGrath acquisition further added to the volatility. We remain comfortable with our position as the business is of high quality and is expected to recover as macroeconomic conditions improve.

Within Technology, our lack of exposure to **Super Micro Computer** was the largest detractor. This company manufactures server solutions for data centres. The stock performed well in 2024. Demand for AI servers and liquid cooling solutions was high, generating strong revenue growth and facilitating significant market share gains. However, we have avoided this name due to the company's failure to meet our quality threshold, as we have concerns about the competition environment, cash flow challenges, and regulatory risks.

Portfolio Positioning

Our investment philosophy remains focused on finding companies with durable franchises, good management teams, and stable earnings, that trade at a discount to their intrinsic value. We stand by our conviction that the investment case for smaller companies is appealing, especially for long-term investors as they include innovative companies that serve market niches and thereby provide investors with early access to innovative companies.

We continue to favour high quality cyclicals, including initiations in the consumer discretionary and basic materials sectors, while also adding to existing holdings that lagged in the quarter. Consistent with our process, these were funded by the sale of certain higher beta cyclicals where valuations had begun to look excessive. We also trimmed some of our lower conviction holdings. Our largest absolute and relative overweight remains in industrials, and our second largest relative overweight is in basic materials.

On the other hand, our largest underweights remain in the Health Care, Telecommunications, Energy, and Technology sectors given the lower quality attributes in key parts of these sectors. However, we continue to look for new ideas in these areas.

Market Outlook

As we enter 2025, we remain constructive on the investment case for small caps, for several reasons. Firstly, valuations are compelling and we see potential for a broadening of returns beyond a handful of US mega-caps, to the market at large, including smaller cap companies. Indeed, the valuation discount of small caps relative to large caps is reminiscent of levels seen during the Tech, Media and Telecom bubble of the late 1990s and early 2000s. Furthermore, while small cap earnings growth has lagged in recent years, Wall Street anticipates that this asset class will nearly double the growth of large caps this year. This optimistic outlook is driven by favourable macro conditions and increased capital spending in innovative areas such as AI, software and healthcare.

A supportive macroeconomic environment is important for small caps, as they tend to generate more of their earnings domestically, compared to larger cap companies. Smaller caps are also more exposed to the economic cycle and the level of interest rates, relative to larger caps, which tend to have stronger balance sheets and lower gearing. The risk of near-term recession appears low, as employment levels are stable, and consumer spending is robust and domestic GDP growth looks set to remain above 2% this year. In addition, interest rates are now well off their highs, with further rate reductions expected over the course of the year.

While tariffs, federal government layoffs, immigration reform and geopolitical changes under the new US presidential administration have introduced more uncertainty into the economic outlook in the early weeks of 2025, our quality-focused investment process has a history of superior downside protection. We intend to maintain our search for innovative, high-quality, smaller cap companies with attractive investment cases, and we will continue to use any bouts of market volatility to act on compelling stock selection opportunities, with a view to building on the Company's long-term track record of strong capital growth and outperformance.

Integrating Environmental, Social and Governance

ESG stands for Environmental, Social and Governance. Awareness of these issues has increased significantly in recent years within the asset management industry, including the investment managers responsible for the Company's portfolio, among the Board members of your Company, among shareholders and potential shareholders in the Company and, indeed in society at large. The Company is not a sustainable or an ESG investment vehicle. However, in actively managed strategies deemed by J.P.Morgan Asset Management (UK) Limited ('JPMAM' or referred to as 'we' or 'us' below) to be ESG-integrated under our governance process, we systemically assess financially material ESG factors (amongst other factors) in our investment analysis and investment decisions, where possible and appropriate, with the goals of managing risk and improving long-term returns.

What is ESG?



E is for Environmental

This component considers a company's impact on the world we live in, relating to the quality and functioning of the natural environment and natural systems.



S is for Social

Social factors address the way that companies act within society; this includes the way that employee interests are managed, and the broader impact a company has on society.



G is for Governance

This component relates to how companies are managed. It considers the measures that protect shareholder interests as well as the way any company meets regulatory and other external obligations.

Why integrate ESG into the investment process?

J.P. Morgan Asset Management (JPMAM) believes that consideration of financially material environmental, social and governance (ESG) issues should be an important part of the investment process. ESG issues will increasingly affect a company's ability to successfully operate and generate returns, today and over the long term. Systematically integrating ESG information into each stage of the investment process, including research, portfolio construction and company engagement, where material and relevant, should contribute to achieving an enhanced financial return, through better-informed investment decisions and strengthened risk management.

With access to more ESG data and better analytical capabilities than ever before, companies can now be evaluated in smarter, more holistic ways. The term for this approach is ESG integration: using financially material ESG factors to generate enhanced risk-adjusted returns.

Integrating ESG into investment decision-making brings about a process that is not very different from how investment decisions have been made historically: looking into the future, factoring in potential risks and opportunities around companies' revenue growth trajectories, and investing accordingly, based on the sustainability of those business models. The difference is that, along with applying traditional financial metrics, the Managers now also access and utilise a set of factors that can help them make even better investments.

While the Manager does not explicitly exclude individual stocks on ESG criteria, ESG factors influence their level of conviction and thus impact a stock's position size within the portfolio.

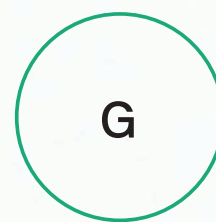
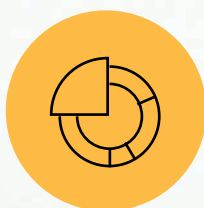
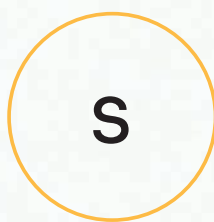
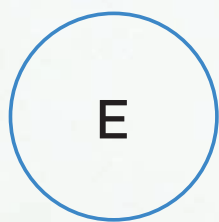
Comprehensive, Integrated Research

A key strength of the investment process is JPMAM's inhouse research, produced by over 100 global fundamental and quantitative equity analysts. The analysts' ESG views on specific companies are the product of proprietary research and one-on-one engagements with companies. They also draw on data from external providers. These ESG views are one of multiple informational inputs into the investment process, alongside data on traditional financial factors, and so are not the sole driver of decision-making.

The research framework uses several internally developed processes to assess the financially material ESG risks and opportunities of any business. An ESG Checklist applies the same detailed 40 questions to more than 2,500 companies under coverage globally. This Checklist asks 12 questions specifically addressing environmental considerations, 14 on social factors and 14 on governance issues. Analysts across Equities and Fixed Income collaborate on the ESG Checklist, with questions about governance tailored to reflect the investment angles of each asset class. The checklist includes both negative and positive questions, and a severity assessment. This is not a 'pass/fail' exercise, but rather a tool to inform discussions between portfolio managers and fundamental analysts, and engagements with the companies they cover.

Questions on the checklist include:



Environmental

- Is the business vulnerable to regulation aimed at limiting greenhouse gas emissions?
- Does the company have issues with toxic emissions, waste management or other environmental damage?
- Is the company failing to manage its use of water resources responsibly?

Social

- Does the company have issues with labour relations?
- Has the company had issues with privacy or data security?
- Does the company engage in anti-competitive behaviour and/or treat its customers unfairly?

Governance

- Does the management fail to admit mistakes?
- Has the company changed key accounting policies?
- Does the owner have a history of poor governance, or of abusing minority shareholders?

Manager's ESG Approach

The checklist, as described on the opposite page, is one tool used to incorporate ESG issues in a meaningful and consistent way. On top of this, they also draw from their own insights and company interactions as well as use other sources including external providers. As the quality and availability of ESG data continues to improve, JPMAM will continue to adapt the process to take advantage of these sources.

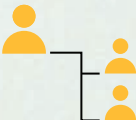
One such source is the United Nations Global Compact (UNGC), a set of 10 business principles which addresses the areas of human rights, labour, the environment, and anti-corruption. The UN believes that by incorporating these principles into strategies, policies and procedures, and establishing a culture of integrity, companies are not only upholding their basic responsibilities to people and the planet but are also setting the stage for long-term success. The UNGC can be effective in identifying outliers to these principles. While there is no official list of companies that do not meet these principles, third party providers have taken the principles and applied their quantitative assessment to identify a 'violators list' of companies they consider to not be adhering to them. This list is very helpful in identifying corporate controversies and assessing how companies manage these controversies. The Manager now considers the UNGC in their investment decisions on behalf of the Company. Where they believe the violations cannot be remedied soon or where the company has not shown any signs of addressing the issue, they will exclude that company. Where it is less clear, they will engage with the company on the issue.

ESG Engagement

Active engagement with companies has long been an integral part of the Manager's approach to investment. Engagement is used not only to understand how companies consider issues related to ESG, but also to try to influence their behaviour, encourage best practices, and to identify potential risks and opportunities.

Engagement driven by the JPMAM Investment Stewardship Team focuses on the six firm-wide priorities detailed below. Underlying each priority are specific themes which are typically topical issues within the industry and with our clients. These themes are reviewed on an annual basis.

Portfolio Managers and Research Analysts in the US Equity Group also directly drive engagement with companies, addressing a broad range of ESG issues as part of their bottom-up stock analysis and ongoing interaction with companies.

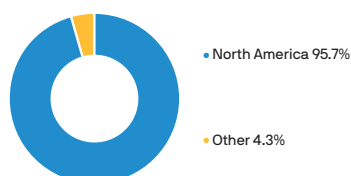

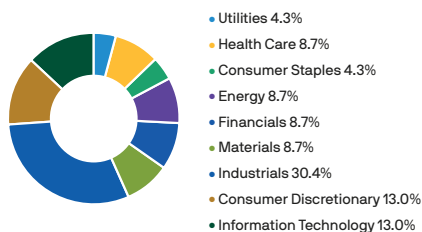

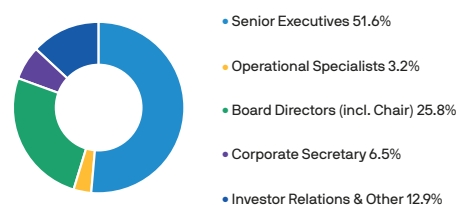
Engagement by region

Examples

Knight-Swift Transportation (KNX)

Knight-Swift Transportation (KNX) is a company that provides truckload transportation and logistics services, helping to move goods efficiently across the country.

We engaged with KNX, including new CEO Adam Miller, on the recent CEO transition and climate disclosures/opportunities. Their updated sustainability report contains a very matter-of-fact discussion about the challenges and opportunities for different decarbonising technologies. Some of the technologies (renewable diesel and renewable natural gas) that are more operationally/economically logical, are not favoured by regulators, who are more interested in electric vehicles. But Electric Vehicles (EVs) have so far not shown the progress KNX would need to rely on them.

We discussed succession planning and the breadth of experience of the Board. We also discussed the new CEO's key priorities for the business including a focus on the core business and an aim of creating greater synergies within the brands, for example through technology.

Climate: we commended KNX on its latest Sustainability Report, which contains a discussion on the challenges of decarbonising the trucking business that parallels what they have been talking about in our prior engagements. We believed that contributed to the low support level (~12%) for the shareholder proposal asking for emissions reductions targets at the 2024 annual meeting.

KNX stressed the challenges of managing two different yardsticks for emissions reductions. Regulators, both at the EPA and the state of California, are very focused on tailpipe emissions. KNX believes it is more appropriate to measure full value chain ('well to wheel') emissions. But they must comply with regulators, which would mean having to spend large amounts of money on solutions that don't show progress. Meanwhile, they get limited credit for solutions that might make more immediate sense like renewable diesel.

We highlighted our recent climate addition to our Proxy Voting Guidelines to stress our focus on this issue when financially material.

RBC Bearings (RBC)

RBC Bearings (RBC) Incorporated designs, manufactures, and markets precision bearings and components for industrial, aerospace, and defence applications.

After a years-long set of engagements (and progress) with RBC Bearings on its executive compensation structure, RBC Bearings was added to the Focus List of engagements in the fall of 2024. This conversation focused on compensation, Board governance, succession planning with the Chief Financial Officer (CFO), General Counsel (GC), and Investor Relations (IR) Director in this offseason meeting.

Compensation: Although we had supported compensation at the 2024 annual meeting, we reiterated our concern about the company's decision to increase the CEO's base salary by 50%. While RBC has continued to face questionable details in their compensation structure over the years, it has not led to a pay-for-performance misalignment and we acknowledged the Company has made consistent incremental improvements in their structure.

Because RBC has made positive (albeit incremental) improvements to its pay structure, we asked how they might think about a simplified version of compensation based on time-based Restricted Stock Units (RSUs) (in contrast to duplicative Short Term Incentives (STI)/Long Term Incentives (LTI) measures, LTI split into separate 1- and 3-year components, STI and LTI tied to base salary, etc.). The Company noted that in its shareholder engagement over the past few years that the 'yardstick' on what is considered best-in-class compensation structure and practices continues to shift, and appreciated the JPMAM view to regularly and thoughtfully evaluate beyond proxy adviser recommendations.

Board Governance and Refreshment: RBC added a new Director, Frederick Elmy, in 2024. Mr. Elmy has reportedly been already very engaged with the Company, including joining every monthly ops management meeting and getting to know executives beyond just the C-suite. They viewed this development positively given some Board members at other companies may not even regularly interact with C-level executives, let alone those beyond C-level, at a regular cadence in their very first year.

When pressed on whether RBC is evaluating any other Board refreshment, the Company felt confident in its existing Board (while stating it keeps a constant pool of candidates). Single skill Board topics such as cybersecurity and IT can be covered by bringing specific experts to educate the Board. RBC did note that potential skillset areas the Board considers critical include compliance (government contractor segment) and the Asia customer market.

We also discussed broader succession planning across the business.

Proxy Voting

Alongside these direct engagements, JPMAM exercises the voting rights of shares held in client portfolios, where entrusted with this responsibility. The Manager seeks to vote in a prudent and diligent manner, based exclusively on its reasonable judgement of what will best serve the financial interests of its clients. JPMAM will aim to vote at all meetings called by the companies in which it is invested, unless there are any market restrictions or conflicts of interests.

In the US Equity Group, proxy voting is a collaboration between investors and the Investment Stewardship specialists in the Global Sustainable Investing Team. JPMAM examines the

share structure and voting arrangements of the companies in which it invests, as well as the board’s balance, oversight functions and remuneration policy. For full details, please see the J.P. Business Review

The Directors present the Strategic Report for the Company's financial year ended 31st December 2024. The aim of the Strategic Report is to provide shareholders with the ability to assess how the Directors have performed their duty to promote the success of the Company for the collective benefit of shareholders. The Chair's Statement together with the Investment Manager's Report, Principal and Emerging Risks, Long Term Viability Statement and Section 172 Statement form part of this Strategic Report.

Business model and Investment Objective

JPMorgan US Smaller Companies Investment Trust plc (the Company) is an investment trust and has a premium listing on the London Stock Exchange (JUSC LN). As an externally managed investment company, all of the Company's day-to-day management and administrative functions are outsourced to service providers. As a result, the Company has no executive directors, employees or internal operations.

The Company's objective is to achieve capital growth from investing in US smaller companies. It aims to outperform the Russell 2000 Index total return, with net dividends reinvested, expressed in sterling terms. In seeking to achieve its objectives, the Company employs JPMorgan Funds Limited (JPMF or the Manager) as its AIFM which, in turn, delegates portfolio management to JPMorgan Asset Management (UK) Limited (JPMAM), to actively manage the Company's assets. The Investment Management team is based in New York. The Board is responsible for all aspects of the Company's affairs, including the setting of parameters for and the monitoring of the investment strategy as well as the review of investment performance and policy. It also has responsibility for all strategic issues, the dividend policy, the share issuance and buy-back policy, gearing, share price and discount/premium monitoring and corporate governance matters. The Board has determined an investment policy and related guidelines and limits, as described below, within which the Investment Manager must operate.

Status of the Company

The Company is subject to UK legislation and regulations including UK company law, UK Financial Reporting Standards, the UK Listing, Prospectus, Disclosure Guidance and Transparency Rules, the AIFMD, the Market Abuse Regulations, taxation law and the Company's own Articles of Association.

The Company is an investment company within the meaning of Section 833 of the Companies Act 2006 and has been approved by HM Revenue & Customs as an investment trust (for the purposes of Sections 1158 and 1159 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010). As a result the Company is not liable for taxation on capital gains on investments within the portfolio. The Directors have no reason to believe that approval will not continue to be retained. The Company is not a close company for taxation purposes.

A review of the Company's activities and prospects is given in the Chair's Statement on pages 9 to 13, and in the Investment Manager's Report on pages 14 to 17.

The Company's purpose, values, strategy and culture

The purpose of the Company is to provide a cost effective, financially sustainable investment vehicle for investors who seek long term capital growth from a portfolio of US smaller companies, which outperforms its benchmark index over the longer term, taking account of wider considerations, including environmental, social and governance issues. To achieve this, the Board of Directors is responsible for employing and overseeing an investment management company that has appropriate investment expertise, resources and controls in place to meet the Company's investment objective. To ensure that it is aligned with the Company's purpose, values and strategy, the Board comprises Directors from a diverse background who have a breadth of relevant experience and contribute in an open boardroom culture that both supports and challenges the Manager and other third party suppliers. For more information, please refer to page 47.

Strategy of the Company

The dynamic nature of the US small cap market makes small caps both exciting and challenging. As an asset class, small caps tend to be less researched, less liquid and prone to more volatility than large-cap stocks. The same characteristics that make managing small caps so challenging provide a unique opportunity. The extensive resources JPMAM dedicates to the process and JPMAM's commitment to buy-side research underlie its belief that stock selection is the most important component in small-cap investing.

The Company is managed by J.P. Morgan's US small cap investment team. The investment team consists of five dedicated small cap specialists based in New York.

The team employs a bottom-up, stock picking approach to portfolio management. The investment philosophy is based on the belief that long-term investments in companies with leading competitive positions, run by highly motivated and talented management that can sustain growth over a period of many years, will lead to stock market outperformance. Alongside this, the team believes that a disciplined valuation process is necessary to enhance long-term returns.

Investment Policies and Risk Management

In order to achieve its investment objective, the Company invests in a well-diversified portfolio of listed US equities and employs a manager with a strong focus on research and company visits in order to identify the most attractive stocks in the US smaller companies universe.

The Board has sought to manage the Company's risk by imposing various investment restrictions and guidelines.

Business Review

These restrictions and guidelines may be varied at any time by the Board at its discretion.

Investment Restrictions and Guidelines

The Board seeks to manage the Company's risk by imposing various investment limits and restrictions:

- No individual investment in the portfolio will be greater than 15% of the Company's gross assets at the time of investment.
- The Company will invest no more than 10% of the Company's gross assets in JPMorgan liquidity funds.
- The Company will invest no more than 10% (subject to Directors' approval) of the Company's gross assets at the time of investment in unquoted investments.
- The Company will not normally invest in derivative instruments, although it can undertake derivative actions to hedge against risk exposure of existing holdings in the portfolio subject to Board approval.
- The Company will use liquidity and borrowings to remain invested within a maximum gearing limit of 15% (+2.5% if as a result of market movement).
- The Company will not invest more than 15% of its gross assets in other UK listed investment companies (including investment trusts).
- The Company will not invest more than 10% of its gross assets in companies that themselves may invest more than 15% of their gross assets in UK listed investment companies.

Monitoring of Compliance

Compliance with the Board's investment restrictions and guidelines is monitored by the Manager and is reported to the Board on a monthly basis.

Performance

In the year to 31st December 2024, the Company's total return on share price was +18.7% and the total return on net assets was +11.3%. This compares with the total return on the Company's benchmark of +13.3%. As at 31st December 2024, the value of the Company's investment portfolio was £316.5 million. The Investment Manager's Report on pages 14 to 17 includes a review of developments during the year as well as information on investment activity within the Company's portfolio.

Total Return, Revenue and Dividends

Gross total return for the year amounted to £32,592,000 (2023: £16,460,000). Net return after deducting the management fee, administrative expenses, finance costs and taxation, amounted to £28,221,000 (2023: £11,785,000).

The Directors recommend a final dividend of 3.1 pence (2023: 3.0 pence) per share payable on 11th July 2025 to shareholders on the register at the close of business on

13th June 2025. No other dividends were paid in respect of the year. The revenue reserve after the payment of the dividend will amount to £2,060,000.

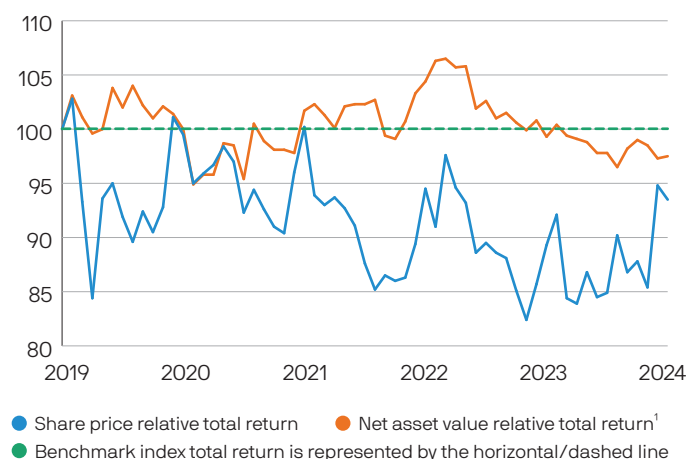

Figures have been rebased to 100 at 31st December 2019

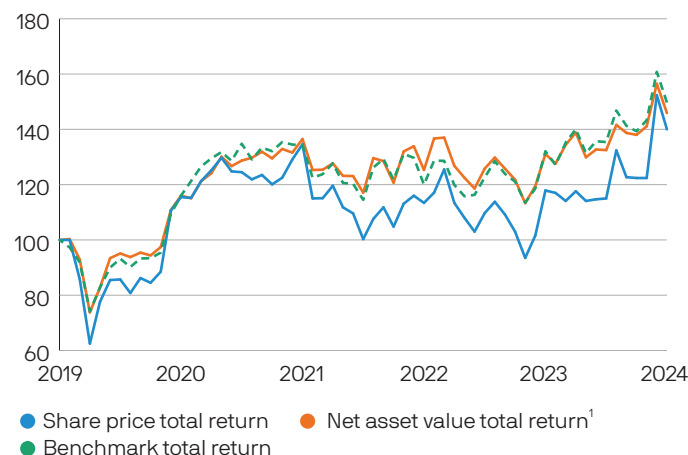

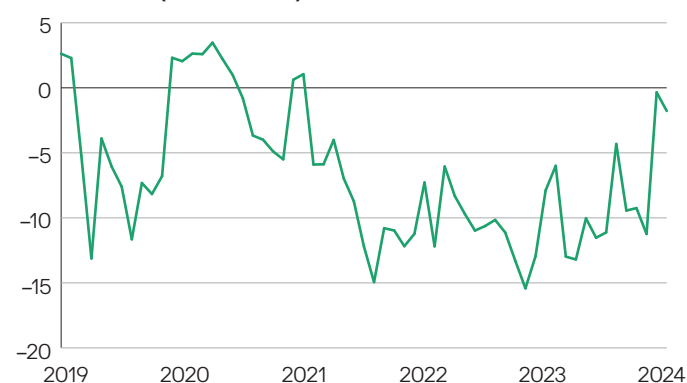
● Performance against the Company's peers

The principal objective is to achieve capital growth and outperformance relative to the benchmark. The Board also monitors the performance relative to a broad range of competitor funds via reporting included in the papers for the regular Board meetings held during the year.

● Performance attribution

The purpose of performance attribution analysis is to assess how the Company achieved its performance relative to its benchmark, i.e. to understand the impact on the Company's relative performance of the various components such as sector selection and stock selection. Details of the attribution analysis for the year ended 31st December 2024 are given in the Investment Manager's Report on page 16.

The Board operates a share issuance and share repurchase programme which seeks to address imbalances in supply of and demand for the Company's shares within the market. This aims to manage both discount volatility and the level of discount in absolute terms and relative to its peers in the sector. In the year to 31st December 2024, the shares traded between a discount of 0.1% and 15.4% and an average discount of 8.9% (based on daily data). Further details of the Company's share capital can be found below in this Strategic Report.

● Ongoing charges

The ongoing charges represent the Company's management fee and all other operating expenses excluding finance costs, expressed as a percentage of the average of the daily net assets during the year. The ongoing charges for the year ended 31st December 2024 are 0.92% (2023: 0.93%). Further details can be found on page 105. The Board reviews the ongoing charges of the Company regularly and on an annual basis compares them against other companies with similar investment objectives and policies.

Share Capital

The Directors have, on behalf of the Company, the authority to issue new Ordinary shares for cash on a non pre-emptive basis and to repurchase shares in the market for cancellation or to be held in Treasury. The Directors will re-issue shares held in Treasury only at a premium to net asset value per share.

During the year, the Company repurchased 99,990 shares for cancellation (2023: nil). The Company repurchased a total of 3,047,895 (2023: 975,473) ordinary shares into Treasury, at an average price of 399.0p and a total cost of £12.2 million, representing 4.66% of the issued share capital as at 31st December 2024. However, nil ordinary shares were reissued from Treasury (2023: nil), and nil new shares were issued during the year (2023: nil). Further details, including the nominal value of these movements, the total proceeds received and the total consideration paid, for these transactions can be found in notes 14 and 15 on pages 87 and 88. The Board will only issue shares in such a way that it would not be dilutive to existing shareholders.

Since the year end and as at 26th March 2025, the last practicable date before the publication of this document, the Company has repurchased a further 369,510 shares into Treasury. The Company has not issued any additional shares from Treasury or new ordinary shares under its ordinary share block listing facility.

Resolutions to renew the authorities to issue new shares on a non pre-emptive basis and to repurchase shares for cancellation or to be held in Treasury will be put to shareholders for approval at the Annual General Meeting.

The full text of these Resolutions is set out in the Notice of Meeting on pages 100 and 101.

Employees, Social, Community and Human Rights Issues

The Company has a management contract with JPMF. It has no employees and all of its Directors are non-executive, the day to day activities being carried out by third parties. There are therefore no disclosures to be made in respect of employees.

The Board notes JPMAM and JPMorgan Chase's global policy statements in respect of Social, Community and Environmental and Human Rights issues, as highlighted in italics:

We are committed to becoming the world's most diverse and inclusive asset manager. We know diverse perspectives create differentiated thinking. We know our client relationships are stronger when our teams mirror the communities in which we work and invest. We reflect these beliefs in our hiring, development and promotion practices, and by nurturing a culture in which everyone is judged on their merits and empowered to hold each other accountable. Beyond our firm, we put our people and assets to work to help

advance equity and economic opportunities – and influence other companies to do the same. We continually reinvest in our communities to close opportunity gaps wherever they exist.

We are working to support the transition to a low-carbon economy by scaling green solutions, balancing environmental, social and economic needs, and managing our operational footprint. We help clients navigate the challenges and realise the economic opportunities of the transition to a low-carbon economy. We believe supporting our clients, through advice and capital, to accelerate their low-carbon transition objectives creates positive environmental benefits and generates long-term financial returns for our shareholders.

We seek to deliver stronger financial outcomes, including by focusing on the most financially material environmental, social and governance (ESG) issues that we believe impact the long-term performance of companies in which we invest. Additionally, we advocate for robust corporate governance and sound business practices. We believe that understanding financially material ESG factors plays an important role in delivering long-term value creation for our clients.

JPMorgan Chase supports fundamental principles of human rights across all our lines of business and in each region of the world in which we operate. JPMorgan Chase's respect for the protection and preservation of human rights is guided by the principles set forth in the United Nations Universal Declaration of Human Rights. JPMorgan Chase believes it is the role of government in each country to protect the human rights, including the safety and security, of its citizens. However, we believe we can play a constructive role in helping to promote respect for human rights by our own actions and by seeking to engage with the governments of the countries with and in which we operate.

Greenhouse Gas Emissions

The Company itself has no premises, consumes no electricity, gas or diesel fuel and consequently does not have a measurable carbon footprint. As a low energy user under HMRC guidelines it is not required to disclose energy and carbon information. The Board notes the policy statements from the Investment Manager in respect of Social, Community and Environmental and Human Rights issues and Greenhouse Gas Emissions and that it is a signatory to the CDP (formerly known as Carbon Disclosure Project), as well as JPMorgan Chase being a signatory to the Equator Principles on managing social and environmental risk in project finance.

The Company, as a closed ended investment fund, is currently exempt from complying with the Task Force on Climate related Financial Disclosures. For more information, please see page 26 of the ESG report.

The Modern Slavery Act 2015 (the 'MSA')

The MSA requires companies to prepare a slavery and human trafficking statement for each financial year of the organisation. As the Company has no employees and does not supply goods and services, the MSA does not apply directly to it. The MSA requirements more appropriately relate to JPMF and JPMAM. Corporate Criminal Offence

The Company maintains zero tolerance towards tax evasion. Shares in the Company are purchased through intermediaries or brokers, therefore no funds flow directly into the Company. As the Company has no employees, the Board's focus is to ensure that the risk of the Company's service providers facilitating tax evasion is also low. To this end it seeks assurance from its service providers that effective policies and procedures are in place.

Future Prospects

The Board continues to focus on maximising total returns over the longer-term. The outlook for the Company is discussed in both the Chair's Statement and the Investment Manager's Report (see pages 13 and 17).

Principal and Emerging Risks

The Directors confirm that they have carried out a robust assessment of the principal and emerging risks facing the Company, including those that would threaten its business model, future performance, solvency or liquidity.

With the assistance of the Manager, the Audit Committee maintains a risk matrix which identifies the principal risks to which the Company is exposed and methods of mitigating against them as far as practicable. The risks identified and the broad categories in which they fall, and the ways in which they are managed or mitigated are summarised below.

The AIC Code of Corporate Governance requires the Audit Committee to put in place procedures to identify emerging risks. At each meeting, the Board reviews all potential risks and considers emerging risks which it defines as potential trends, sudden events or changing risks which are characterised by a high degree of uncertainty in terms of occurrence probability and possible effects on the Company. As the impact of emerging risks is understood, these risks may be entered on the Company's risk matrix and mitigating actions considered as necessary.

In assessing the risks and how they can be mitigated, the Board has given particular attention to those risks that might threaten the viability of the Company.

These principal and emerging risks are listed below. It should be noted that the emergence of, or a change in, a risk can have an impact on another risk:

Long Term Viability

Long Term Viability

The Company is an investment trust with an objective of achieving capital growth from investing in US smaller companies. The Company enjoys the benefit of the closed ended structure and is therefore better able to withstand market movements since it is not subject to forced liquidation of investments due to sudden or large redemptions by shareholders.

The Board notes by way of context that the Company has invested through many difficult economic and market cycles since its incorporation in 1955. The Board is cognisant of the unusually high levels of political, economic and market uncertainty being experienced at the current time and its potential impact on the prospects of many of the Company's portfolio holdings. This includes the continuing war between Ukraine and Russia and more recently the conflict in the Middle East, the political tensions between the US and China and the global trade implications following the election of the new President. Notwithstanding these crises, given the factors stated below, the Board expects the Company to continue for the foreseeable future and has conducted its assessment for a period of five years.

In conducting its assessment of the long term viability of the Company, the Board has taken account of the Company's current financial position, its debt level and debt covenants, the liquidity of its holdings as well as the principal and emerging risks that it faces (see page 36), the investment capabilities of the Manager, the Manager's historical longer term investment performance and the current outlook for the US economy and its equity markets.

The Board has further considered the mitigation measures which key service providers, including the Manager, have in place to maintain operational resilience.

In addition to the above, the Company has carried out stress testing of a number of scenarios where the Company might be put under significant stress due to market volatility. This included modelling the impact of substantial market falls and testing portfolio liquidity under stress. The results demonstrated the impact on the Company's NAV, its expenses, its debt levels and the covenants attached to that debt as well as the Company's ability to meet its liabilities. In even the most stressed scenario, the Company was shown to have sufficient cash, or to be able to liquidate a sufficient portion of its listed holdings, in order to meet its liabilities as they fall due. See notes 13 and 14 on pages 86 and 87.

The Directors consider five years to be an appropriate time horizon to assess the Company's viability. In determining this time horizon the Directors had regard to their view that, given the Company's objective of achieving capital growth, shareholders should consider the Company as a long term investment proposition. This is consistent with advice provided by independent financial advisers and wealth managers, that investors should consider investing in equities for a minimum of five years. The Directors also take account of the inherent uncertainties of equity markets and the existence of a continuation vote every five years.

The Board has also taken into account the fact that the Company has a continuation vote to be considered by shareholders at the Company's 2025 AGM and the likelihood of shareholders voting in favour of continuation, having consulted the Company's major shareholders through the remit of its advisers.

The Directors confirm that they have a reasonable expectation that the Company will be able to continue in operation, subject to shareholders voting in favour of continuation at the AGM in 2025, and meet its liabilities as they fall due over the next five years until 31st December 2029. This reasonable expectation is subject to there being no significant adverse change to the regulatory or taxation environment for investment trusts; and subject to there being no sustained adverse investment performance by the current or any successive Portfolio Managers, that may result in the Company not being able to maintain a supportive shareholder base.

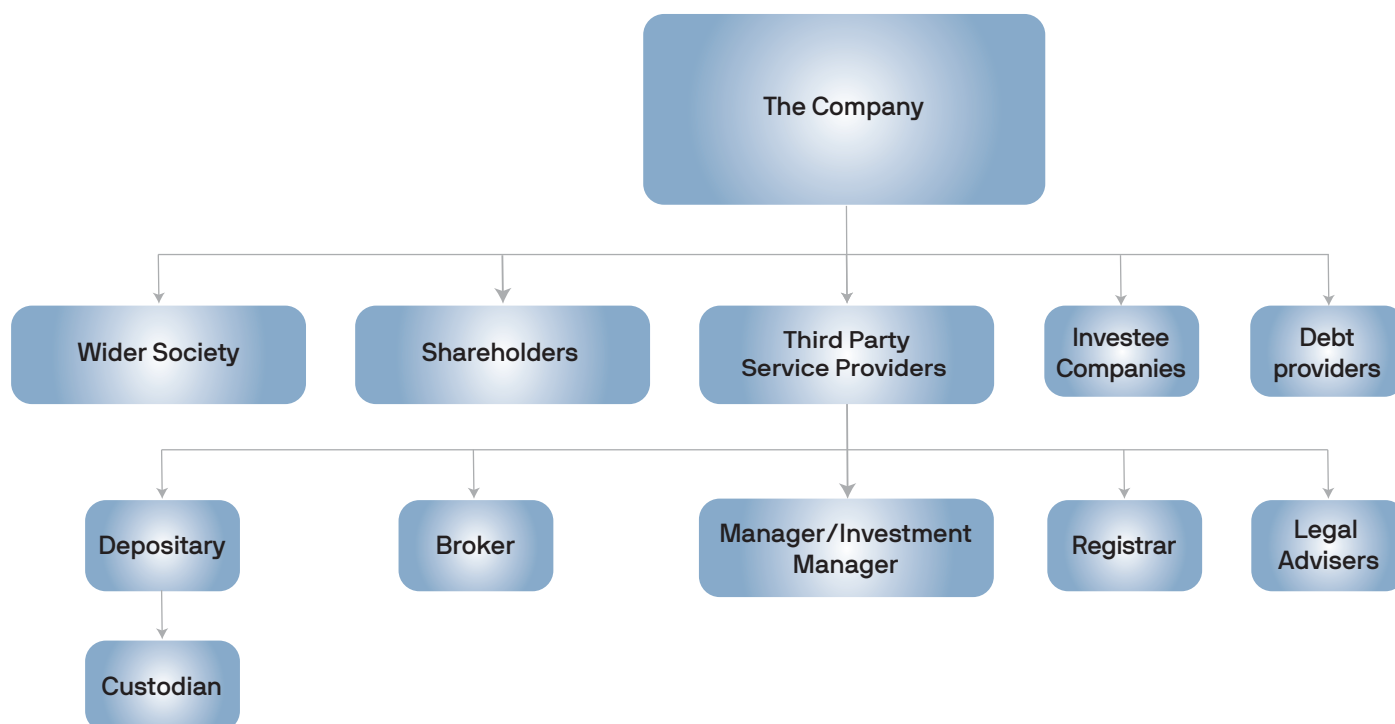

Shareholders

Continued shareholder engagement is critical to the continued existence of the Company and the successful delivery of its long-term strategy. The Board is focused on fostering and maintaining good working relationships with shareholders and understanding the views of shareholders in order to incorporate them into the Board's strategic thinking and objectives. Shareholders are encouraged to attend the Company's Annual General Meeting. Shareholders can contact Directors via the Company Secretary. In addition, the Chair and Directors make themselves available as and when required to address shareholders' queries and offer meetings to larger shareholders. Engagement with shareholders has also improved with the increased use of regular webcasts and the opportunity for shareholders to sign up for electronic news updates. The Board continues to investigate actively how to improve communications and engagement with shareholders including through company communications, the Company's website etc.

Manager

The principal supplier is the Manager, in particular the investment management team who are responsible for managing the Company's assets in order to achieve its stated investment objective. The Board maintains a good working relationship with the Manager, who also provides administrative support and promotes the Company through its investment trust sales and marketing teams. The Board monitors the Company's investment performance at each Board Meeting in relation to its objective and also to its investment policy and strategy. The Board also maintains strong lines of communication with the Manager via its dedicated company secretary and client director whose interactions extend well beyond the formal business addressed at each Board and Committee meeting. This enables the Board to remain regularly informed of the views of the Manager and the Company's shareholders (and vice versa).

Duty to Promote the Success of the Company

Investee companies

The Board is committed to responsible investing and actively monitors the activities of investee companies through its delegation to the Manager. In order to achieve this, the Manager has discretionary powers to exercise voting rights on behalf of the Company on all resolutions proposed by the investee companies. In respect of the year under review, the Manager engaged with many of its investee companies and voted at all of the annual general meetings and extraordinary meetings held during the year by the Company's portfolio companies (full details can be found in the ESG report on page 25). The Board monitors investments made and divested and questions the Manager's rationale for exposures taken and voting decisions made.

Other key service providers

The Board ensures that it promotes the success of the Company by engaging specialist third party suppliers, with appropriate capability, performance records, resources and controls in place to deliver the services that the Company requires for support in meeting relevant obligations and safeguarding the Company's assets. For this reason, the Board considers the Company's Custodian, Depositary, Registrar and Broker to be stakeholders. The Board maintains regular contact with its key external service providers, either directly, or via its dedicated company secretary or client director, and receives regular reporting from these providers at Board and Committee meetings. The Management Engagement Committee meets annually to review and appraise its key service providers.

Wider society and the Environment

Whilst strong long term investment performance is essential for an investment trust, the Board recognises that to provide an investment vehicle that is sustainable over the long term, both it and the Manager must have regard to ethical and environmental issues that impact society. Hence environmental, social and governance (ESG) considerations are integrated into the Manager's investment process and will continue to evolve. Further details of the Manager's integrated approach to ESG can be found on pages 18 to 27.

The Manager is a signatory to the UK Stewardship Code. This reflects the Manager's commitment to stewardship responsibilities and to drive positive corporate change and industry developments to benefit not only the Company but also the environment and wider society over the long-term.

Key Decisions and Actions

The Directors confirm that they have considered their duty under Section 172 when making decisions during the financial year under review. Key decisions and actions during the year which have required the Directors to have regard to applicable section 172 factors include:

Dividends Payable to Shareholders

Although the Company's objective is to deliver capital growth, the level of dividends paid are a key consideration for the Board, given the ongoing demand for income. In the Company's financial year ended 31st December 2024, the Company's revenue for the year, after expenses and tax, decreased from the prior year by 9.6%. The Board has declared a final dividend of 3.1 pence per share.

Share buybacks

The Board pursues an active buyback policy which aims to enhance value for current investors by buying shares at anything wider than a small discount to NAV. In addition to the primary benefit of the NAV enhancement provided to existing shareholders, the buyback policy has the effect of reducing discount volatility and improving liquidity in the Company's shares, both of which should be beneficial to shareholders.

During the year 3,047,895 shares were purchased into Treasury, at a cost of £12.2 million, representing 4.66% of the Company's issued share capital at the beginning of 2024, and at an average discount to NAV of 8.9%.

Re-appointment of Manager

The Directors have reviewed the competitiveness of the management fee and the Company's other operating costs; held the Manager to account for investment performance; encouraged the Manager to enhance its sales and marketing efforts and further integrate ESG into the Manager's investment process. A review of the Manager and its services was undertaken during the year by the Management Engagement Committee. Post the review process, the Board re-appointed the Manager.

Duty to Promote the Success of the Company

Succession Planning

The Board has continued to progress its orderly succession plans during the year. The Board believes that the current optimal size of the Board is four Directors. Ahead of the retirement of Shefaly Yogendra following the AGM in 2026, the Board intends to appoint a new Non-Executive Director in the latter half of 2025. Accordingly it will appoint an external executive search company to find a suitable candidate for this position. Your Directors believe that shareholder interests are best served by ensuring a smooth and orderly succession for the Board which serves to provide both continuity and refreshment whilst ensuring diversity of both background and experience.

Raising the Profile of the Company

The Board is focussed on enhancing the sales and marketing efforts of the Company. The Board engaged a third party to refine the Company's key attributes and attractions, alongside the development of a marketing plan to raise awareness of the Company amongst existing and potential shareholders. The same third party now supports the Manager to make compelling content to aid the promotion of the Company. The Board continues to encourage the Manager to enhance its sales, marketing and PR efforts, having initiated a series of promotional activities over 2024 to raise awareness of the Company.

It is important that the Company remains front of mind with both institutional and retail investors. The Board employs Kepler to provide research notes for the Company twice a year. In addition, the Portfolio Managers also use webcasts and speak at video conferences, organised by brokers and external companies. The Company's website has been enhanced.

Borrowings and Gearing

The Board, with discussion with the portfolio managers, regularly reviews the Company's debt position. This process includes identifying the need for finance, the type of finance and the parties to work with. This leads to pricing and term discussions including covenants with the selected debt provider. The Company, through its Manager, maintains the relationship and continued engagement with the debt provider which includes regular debt compliance reporting.

The Company's multicurrency revolving unsecured loan facility with Scotiabank was due to be renewed on 27th October 2023. The facility was extended to 15th March 2024 to allow time to finalise the loan renewal documentation, the delay being caused by the move from unsecured to secured. On 15th March 2024 the Board renewed the facility with Scotiabank, the new facility being a secured 364 day facility for a reduced amount of US\$20 million (with a US\$10 million accordion option). This facility was renewed with a new loan provider, Bank of America, on 14th March 2025. The current facility is a secured 360 day evergreen facility for an increased amount of US\$35 million (with a US\$5 million accordion option).

Change of Registrar

As part of review of its key service providers, the Company, through its Manager, undertook a review of Equiniti Limited ('Equiniti'), its Registrar, which has been engaged by the Company for a number of years. After a request to various potential providers for proposals and a thorough due diligence process by the Manager, and after careful consideration, the Board, with effect from 15th July 2024, moved the Company's registrar services from Equiniti to Computershare Investor Service Plc ('Computershare') as it believed this to be in the best interests of shareholders.

Miscellaneous

In addition, the Directors have kept under review the competitiveness of the management fee and the Company's other operating costs; they have undertaken a robust review of the principal and emerging risks faced by the Company; they have continued to encourage the Manager to enhance its sales and marketing efforts; they have discussed, confirmed and monitored the Company's dividend; and they have discussed and monitored gearing levels and the Portfolio Managers' requirements for cash.

Furthermore, the Board has been in frequent contact with the Manager, receiving regular updates on the operating effectiveness of the Manager and key service providers and on areas such as portfolio performance and activity, portfolio liquidity and the discount to NAV at which the Company's shares trade.

Directors' Report

The Directors present their report and the audited financial statements for the year ended 31st December 2024.

Directors

The Directors of the Company who held office at the date of this report are detailed on page 47.

Details of Directors' beneficial shareholdings may be found in the Directors' Remuneration Report on page 64. No changes have been reported to the Directors' shareholdings since the year end.

In accordance with corporate governance best practice, all Directors will retire at the forthcoming Annual General Meeting (AGM) and, being eligible, will offer themselves for reappointment by shareholders. The Board seeks to balance the need for refreshment of its members with the value derived from their experience and continuity. The Nomination Committee, having considered their qualifications, performance and contribution to the Board and Committees, confirms that each Director continues to be effective and demonstrates commitment to the role, and the Board recommends to shareholders that those standing for reappointment be reappointed. Statements supporting the Directors' reappointments can be found on page 52.

Director Indemnification and Insurance

As permitted by the Company's Articles of Association, the Directors have the benefit of a deed of indemnity which is a qualifying third party indemnity, as defined by Section 234 of the Companies Act 2006. The indemnities were in place during the year and as at the date of this report.

During the year an insurance policy has been maintained by the Company which indemnifies the Directors of the Company against certain liabilities arising in the conduct of their duties. There is no cover against fraudulent or dishonest actions.

Management of the Company

The Manager and Company Secretary to the Company is JPMorgan Funds Limited (JPMF), a company authorised and regulated by the FCA. The active management of the Company's assets is delegated by JPMF to an affiliate, JPMorgan Asset Management (UK) Limited (JPMAM) with day to day investment management activity conducted in New York. The Manager is a wholly-owned subsidiary of JPMorgan Chase Bank which, through other subsidiaries, also provides marketing, banking, dealing and custodian services to the Company.

The Manager is employed under a contract which can be terminated on six months' notice, without penalty. If the Company wishes to terminate the contract on shorter notice, the balance of remuneration is payable by way of compensation.

Manager Evaluation

The Board, through the Management Engagement Committee, conducts a formal evaluation of the performance

of, and contractual relationship with, the Manager on an annual basis. The evaluation covers the performance of, and contractual relationship with the Manager, its management processes, investment style, resources and risk controls and the quality of support that the Company receives from the Manager including marketing and investor support, and as AIFM and Company Secretary to the Company. As part of this process and under normal circumstances, the Board completes a due diligence visit of the Manager's operations in New York each year. The latest evaluation of the Manager, Investment Manager and the Portfolio Managers was carried out in early 2025 by way of a questionnaire that was facilitated by an external provider, which provided a report on the outcome of the evaluation, including a summary of strengths and areas for improvement.

As a result of that process, the Management Engagement Committee concluded, that in its opinion, the continuing appointment of the Manager on the terms agreed was in the interests of shareholders as a whole.

The Alternative Investment Fund Managers Directive (AIFMD)

JPMF is the Company's alternative investment fund manager (AIFM). It is approved as an AIFM by the FCA. For the purposes of the AIFMD the Company is an alternative investment fund (AIF).

JPMF has delegated responsibility for the day to day management of the Company's portfolio to JPMAM. The Company has appointed Bank of New York Mellon (International) Limited (BNY) as its depositary. BNY has appointed JPMorgan Chase Bank, N.A. as the Company's custodian. BNY is responsible for the oversight of the custody of the Company's assets and for monitoring its cash flows.

The AIFMD requires certain information to be made available to investors in AIFs before they invest and requires that material changes to this information be disclosed in the annual report of each AIF. An Investor Disclosure Document, which sets out information on the Company's investment strategy and policies, leverage, risk, liquidity, administration, management, fees, conflicts of interest and other shareholder information is available on the Company's website at www.jpmmusmallercompanies.co.uk. There have been no material changes (other than those reflected in these Financial Statements) to this information requiring disclosure. Any information requiring immediate disclosure pursuant to the AIFMD will be disclosed to the London Stock Exchange through a primary information provider.

As an authorised AIFM, JPMF will make the requisite disclosures on remuneration levels and policies to the FCA at the appropriate time.

There are no restrictions concerning the transfer of securities in the Company; no special rights with regard to control attached to securities; no agreements between holders of securities regarding their transfer known to the Company; no agreements which the Company is party to that affect its control following a takeover bid; and no agreements between the Company and its Directors concerning compensation for loss of office.

Listing Rule 6.6.4R

The Directors confirm that there are no disclosures to be made in this regard.

Resolutions relating to the following items of special business will be proposed at the forthcoming Annual General Meeting (AGM):

(i) Continuation Vote (Resolution 11)

The Directors recommend that the Company continues in existence as an investment trust for a further five year period. The resolution on the continuation of the Company is put to shareholders every five years. The Directors' recommendation on this Resolution is explained in the Chair's Statement on page 10. They unanimously recommend that shareholders vote in favour of the Company's continuation.

(ii) Authority to allot new shares and to disapply statutory pre-emption rights (resolutions 12 and 13)

The Directors will seek authority at the Annual General Meeting to issue up to 6,025,275 new ordinary shares for cash up to an aggregate nominal amount of £150,632, such amount being equivalent to 10% of the present issued share capital (excluding Treasury shares, if any or, if different, the number of ordinary shares which is equal to 10% of the Company's issued share capital (excluding Treasury shares) as at the date of the passing of the resolution). This authority will expire at the Annual General Meeting in 2026 or the date occurring 18 months from the date on which this resolution is passed, whichever is the earlier, unless renewed, revoked or varied by the Company at a general meeting prior to such time.

It is advantageous for the Company to be able to issue new shares (or to sell Treasury shares) to investors when the Directors consider that it is in the best interests of shareholders to do so. As such, issues are only made at prices greater than the net asset value, they increase the assets underlying each share and spread the Company's administrative expenses, other than the management fee which is charged on the value of the Company's assets, over a greater number of shares. The issue proceeds are available for investment in line with the Company's investment policies.

(iii) Authority to allot further new Ordinary shares and to disapply statutory pre-emption rights (resolutions 14 and 15)

In addition to any authorities granted by resolutions 12 and 13 above, the Directors will seek renewal of the authority at the AGM to issue new Ordinary shares for cash on a non pre-emptive basis up to an aggregate nominal amount of £150,632 such amount being equivalent to 10% of the present issued Ordinary share capital (excluding Treasury shares) as at the last practicable date before the publication of the Notice of Meeting or, if different, the number of ordinary shares which is equal to 10% of the Company's issued share capital (excluding Treasury shares) as at the date of the passing of the resolution. This authority will expire at the conclusion of the Company's AGM in 2026 or the date occurring 18 months from the date on which this resolution is passed, whichever is the earlier, unless renewed, revoked or varied by the Company at a general meeting prior to such time.

The full text of the resolutions 12 to 15 is set out in the Notice of Annual General Meeting on pages 100 and 101. If each of resolutions 12 to 15 are passed, the Company will have the ability to issue, on a non pre-emptive basis, up to 20% of its

issued share capital (excluding shares held in Treasury) as at the date of the passing of the resolutions.

(iv) Authority to repurchase the Company's shares (resolution 16)

At the Annual General Meeting held on 22nd April 2024, shareholders gave authority to the Company to purchase up to 14.99% of its then issued share capital. This authority will expire at the conclusion of the Company's AGM in 2025 or the date occurring 18 months from the date on which this resolution is passed, whichever is the earlier, unless renewed, revoked or varied by the Company at a general meeting prior to such time, and could be renewed by shareholders at any time at a General Meeting of the Company. The Board remains committed to a strong/disciplined discount management policy, but there is a need to balance the short term of buying shares back for cancellation or holding in Treasury with the long term liquidity implications. It will seek shareholder approval to renew the authority at the forthcoming Annual General Meeting.

The full text of the resolution (to be proposed as a special resolution) to renew the share repurchase authority is set out as Resolution number 16 in the Notice of Meeting on page 101.

(v) Authority to hold general meetings (resolution 17)

A general meeting, other than an Annual General Meeting, may be called on not less than 14 clear days' notice.

Recommendation (resolutions 11 to 17)

The Board considers that resolutions 11 to 17 are likely to promote the success of the Company and are in the best interests of the Company and its shareholders as a whole. The Directors unanimously recommend that you vote in favour of the resolutions as they intend to do in respect of their own beneficial holdings which amount in aggregate to 18,750 shares representing approximately 0.03% of the voting rights in the Company.

Other Information

The recommended final dividend, as well as information on acquisition of the Company's own shares and greenhouse gas emissions, can be found in the Business Review.

Financial risk management objectives and policies, with information on exposure to price, credit and liquidity risk, can be found in note 21 to the Financial Statements. Information on post balance sheet events can be found in note 23.

Compliance

The Board is committed to high standards of corporate governance. It has considered the principles and provisions of the AIC Code of Corporate Governance published in 2019 (the 'AIC Code'), which addresses the principles and provisions set out in the UK Corporate Governance Code (the 'UK Code') published in 2018, as they apply to investment trust companies. It considers that reporting against the AIC Code, therefore,

provides more appropriate information to the Company's shareholders. Through ongoing advice from the Company Secretary and the use of a detailed checklist, the Board confirms that the Company has complied with the principles and provisions of the AIC Code, in so far as they apply to the Company's business, throughout the year under review.

As all of the Company's day-to-day management and administrative functions are outsourced to third parties, it has no executive directors, employees or internal operations and therefore has not reported in respect of the following:

- the role of the executive directors and senior management;
- executive directors' and senior management remuneration;
- internal audit; and
- the workforce.

In January 2024, the Financial Reporting Council ('FRC') updated the UK Code. This new UK Code will apply to financial years beginning on or after 1st January 2025. In August 2024, the AIC updated the AIC Corporate Governance Code (the '2024 AIC Code'), which incorporates changes to the UK Code by the FRC in January 2024. The 2024 AIC Code applies to accounting periods beginning on or after 1st January 2025, with the exception of new Provision 34. Provision 34 is applicable for accounting periods beginning on or after 1st January 2026.

The Company will be reporting against the new 2024 AIC Code in accordance with the time frame set out above.

Role of the Board

A management agreement between the Company and JPMF sets out the matters over which the Manager has authority. This includes management of the Company's assets and the provision of accounting, company secretarial, administrative services and some marketing services. All other matters are reserved for the approval of the Board. A formal schedule of matters reserved to the Board for decision has been approved. This includes determination and monitoring of the Company's investment objectives and policy and its future strategic direction, gearing policy, management of the capital structure, appointment and removal of third party service providers, review of key investment and financial data and the Company's corporate governance and risk control arrangements.

At each Board meeting, Directors' interests are considered. These are reviewed carefully, taking into account the circumstances surrounding them, and, if considered appropriate, are approved. It was resolved that there were no actual or indirect interests of a Director which conflicted with the interests of the Company which arose during the year.

The Board has procedures in place to deal with potential conflicts of interest and, following the introduction of The

Bribery Act 2010, has adopted appropriate procedures designed to prevent bribery. It confirms that the procedures have operated effectively during the year under review.

The Board meets at least quarterly during the year and additional meetings are arranged as necessary. Full and timely information is provided to the Board to enable it to function effectively and to allow Directors to discharge their responsibilities.

There is an agreed procedure for Directors to take independent professional advice if necessary and at the Company's expense. This is in addition to the access that every Director has to the advice and services of the Company Secretary, JPMF, which is responsible for ensuring that the Board complies with applicable rules, regulations and Board procedures.

Board Composition and Chair

At the financial year-end, the Board consisted of four non-executive Directors, chaired by Dominic Neary, all of whom are regarded by the Board as independent of the Company's Manager, including the Chair. Given the size of the Board, all Directors are members of the Nomination, Remuneration, Management Engagement and Audit Committees.

The Directors have a breadth of investment, business and financial skills and experience relevant to the Company's business. The Board is well diversified in terms of gender, ethnicity and experience. Brief biographical details of each Director are set out on page 47.

There have been no changes to the Chair's significant commitments during the year under review.

In order to provide a balance of skills, experience, length of service and ages, it is the Board's policy to introduce new Directors to provide an orderly succession over time.

The Board's policy on diversity, including gender and ethnicity, is to take account of the benefits of this during the appointment process. The Board remains committed to appointing the most appropriate candidate and seeks to ensure that it does not unwittingly exclude any group.

A review of Board composition and balance is included as part of the annual performance evaluation of the Board.

Senior Independent Director

The Senior Independent Director, Christopher Metcalfe, leads the evaluation of the performance of the Chair and is available to shareholders if they have concerns that cannot be resolved through discussion with the Chair.

Board Diversity and Inclusion

When recruiting a new Director, the Board's policy is to appoint individuals on merit. Diversity is important in bringing an appropriate range of skills and experience to the Board and an assessment is made of the qualities and skills of the existing Board before appointing new Directors. Having

recently completed a review of the skills and experience of Directors, the Board believes that it is equipped with the necessary attributes required for the sound stewardship of the Company and that their knowledge sets allow for lively and engaging debates. Please refer to page 54 for more information on the workings of the Nomination Committee.

Full details of the skills and experience of the Directors can be found on page 47. At 31st December 2024, there were two male Directors and two female Directors on the Board. The following disclosures are provided in respect of the FCA Listing rules targets: (i) 40% of a board should be women; (ii) at least one senior role should be held by a woman; and (iii) at least one board member should be from a non-white ethnic background, as defined by the Office of National Statistics (ONS) criteria. As an externally managed investment company with no chief executive officer (CEO) or chief financial officer (CFO), the roles which qualify as senior under FCA guidance are Chair and Senior Independent Director (SID). The Board also considers the Audit Committee Chair to represent a senior role within this context.

At 31st December 2024, the Board met the target on gender diversity criteria, female representation in a senior role and ethnic representation on the Board. The small size of the Board with only non-executive Directors can present challenges to ensuring targeted diversity in Board appointments. Although the Board does not consider it appropriate to set targets, it ensures that long lists include diverse candidates of appropriate experience and merit.

Resolution 6 concerns the reappointment of Christopher Metcalfe. He joined the Board in January 2019 and has served for five years as a Director. Christopher has extensive US equity management and investment trust experience. He is the Senior Independent Director.

Resolution 7 concerns the reappointment of Dominic Neary. He joined the Board in January 2019 and has served for five years as a Director. Dominic managed US and global equity portfolios over his 20-year investment career, and has been involved with investment trusts throughout this time.

Resolution 8 concerns the reappointment of Shefaly Yogendra. She joined the Board in November 2016 and has served for seven years as a Director. The Board confirms that each of the Directors standing for reappointment at the forthcoming AGM continue to contribute

effectively and recommends that shareholders vote in favour of their reappointment.

Tenure

Directors are initially appointed until the following Annual General Meeting when, under the Company's Articles of Association, it is required that they be reappointed by shareholders. Subject to the performance evaluation carried out each year, the Board will agree whether it is appropriate for Directors to seek annual reappointment. The Board has adopted corporate governance best practice and has a succession plan in place. All Directors must stand for annual reappointment.

The Board believes in regular refreshment of the Board and its Committees and in the benefits of having a diverse range of experience, skills, length of service and backgrounds (see our diversity policy on page 51).

The Board is also of the view that length of service will not necessarily compromise the independence or contribution of directors of an investment trust company or, indeed, its chair. Continuity and experience can add significantly to the strength of the board especially in times of market turbulence. The Board has noted the inference of provisions in the UK Corporate Governance Code that non-executive directors who have served for more than nine years should be presumed not to be independent. However, the AIC does not believe that this presumption is necessarily appropriate for investment companies and therefore does not recommend that long-serving directors be prevented from forming part of an investment trust board. However, in normal circumstances the Chair and Directors are expected to serve for a nine-year term, but this may be adjusted for reasons of flexibility and continuity.

The table below details the tenure of Directors, who are standing for reappointment, as at the forthcoming Annual General Meeting and projected forward to 2028. The average tenure of a Director is less than six years.

The terms and conditions of Directors' appointments are set out in formal letters of appointment, copies of which are available for inspection on request at the Company's registered office and at the Annual General Meeting. With effect from 1st January 2015, any appointment of a new non-executive Director of the Company shall not exceed a nine-year term, in normal circumstances.

A schedule of interests for each Director is maintained by the Company and reviewed at every Board meeting. New interests are considered carefully, taking into account the circumstances surrounding them and, if considered appropriate, are approved.

A list of potential conflicts of interest for each Director is maintained by the Company. These are considered carefully, taking into account the circumstances surrounding them, and, if considered appropriate, are approved.

Induction and Training

On appointment, the Manager and Company Secretary provide all Directors with induction training. Thereafter, regular briefings are provided on changes in law and regulatory requirements that affect the Company and the Directors. Directors are encouraged to attend industry and other seminars covering issues and developments relevant to investment trust companies. Regular reviews of the Directors' training needs are carried out by the Nomination Committee by means of the evaluation process described below.

Meetings and Committees

The Board delegates certain responsibilities and functions to committees. Details of membership of committees are shown with the Directors' profiles on page 47. All Directors are members of the Committees.

The table below details the number of meetings attended by each Director out of those available to be attended. As well as the formal meetings detailed above, the Board communicates frequently by email or telephone to deal with matters as they arise. In addition, there was regular contact between the Directors and the Manager and Company Secretary throughout the year. The Board visits New York annually to meet members of the JPMF team, some of the investee companies, industry experts and business leaders.

Board Committees

Nomination Committee

The Nomination Committee, chaired by Dominic Neary, meets at least annually to ensure that the Board has an appropriate balance of skills and experience to carry out its fiduciary duties and to select and propose suitable candidates for appointment when necessary. The appointment process takes account of the benefits of diversity, including gender and ethnicity.

The Board's policy on diversity, is set out on page 51.

Ahead of the retirement of Shefaly Yogendra in 2026, and as part of the long-term succession programme, the Board intends to appoint a new Non-Executive Director in late 2025. Accordingly, the Board is in the process of appointing an external executive search company, to find a suitable candidate for this position.

The Committee conducts an annual performance evaluation of the Board, its committees and individual Directors to ensure that all Directors have devoted sufficient time and contributed adequately to the work of the Board and its Committees. The evaluation of the Board considers the balance of experience, skills, independence, corporate knowledge, its diversity and how the Board works together as a group.

Questionnaires, drawn up by the Board, with the assistance of the Manager and external consultant BoardForms Ltd, are completed by each Director. The responses are collated and then discussed by the Committee. The evaluation of individual Directors is led by the Chair. The Senior Independent Director,

Christopher Metcalfe, leads the evaluation of the Chair's performance.

The Nomination Committee is cognisant of the FCA's rules announced in April 2022 on diversity and inclusion on company boards.

Remuneration Committee

The Remuneration Committee, chaired by Shefaly Yogendra, reviews Directors' fees and makes recommendations to the Board as and when appropriate in relation to remuneration policy and implementation. This takes into account the level of fees paid to the directors of the Company's peers and within the investment trust industry generally to ensure that high quality people are attracted and retained.

Management Engagement Committee

The Management Engagement Committee, chaired by Dominic Neary, consists of all of the Directors and meets annually to review the performance of the Manager and the third party service providers of the Company. The Committee conducts a formal evaluation of the Manager on an annual basis. The evaluation includes consideration of the investment strategy and process of the Investment Manager, noting outperformance of the benchmark over the long term, and the quality of support that the Company receives from JPMF. The Committee also reviews the Company's agreements with other major service providers. As a result of the evaluation process, the Board confirms that it is satisfied that the continuing appointment of the Manager is in the interests of shareholders as a whole.

Audit Committee

The report of the Audit Committee, which is chaired by Mandy Donald, is set out on pages 58 to 60.

Terms of Reference

The Nomination, Remuneration, Management Engagement and Audit Committees have written terms of reference which define clearly their respective responsibilities, copies of which are available for inspection on the Company's website and on request at the Company's registered office and at the Annual General Meeting.

Going Concern

The Directors' statement on going concern is detailed on page 59.

Relations with Shareholders

The Board regularly monitors the shareholder profile of the Company. It aims to provide shareholders with a full understanding of the Company's activities and performance and reports formally to shareholders two times a year by way of the Annual Report and Financial Statements, and Half Year Report. This is supplemented by the daily publication, through

the London Stock Exchange, of the net asset value of the Company's shares and the Company's level of gearing and the monthly publication of a Company factsheet. Shareholders can also register to receive regular electronic updates about the Company.

All shareholders have the opportunity, and are encouraged, to attend the Company's Annual General Meeting at which the Directors and representatives of the Manager are available in person to meet with and answer shareholders' questions. In addition, a presentation is given by the Portfolio Managers who review the Company's performance.

During the year the Company's broker and the Manager held regular discussions with larger shareholders. The Directors are made fully aware of their views. In addition, on a regular basis the Board invites the Company's brokers, who are independent of the manager, to present to the Directors and also asks them to canvass shareholder views when appropriate. Through them, the Board not only receives an independent and well informed report on shareholder views, but also is able to offer shareholders meetings with the Chair or the Directors as and when required to address any queries. The Directors may be contacted through the Company Secretary whose details are shown on page 110 or via the Company's website. All communications from shareholders that are intended for the Board are forwarded in full directly to the Chair for his response.

The Company's Annual Report and Financial Statements is published in time to give shareholders at least 20 working days' notice of the AGM. Shareholders wishing to raise questions in advance of the meeting are encouraged to submit questions via the Company's website or write to the Company Secretary at the address shown on page 110. A formal process is in place for all letters to the Chair or other Directors to be forwarded immediately. As part of this process, any feedback from shareholders is also communicated to the Board.

Details of the proxy voting position on each resolution will be published on the Company website shortly after the AGM.

Risk Management and Internal Control

The AIC Code requires the Directors, at least annually, to review the effectiveness of the Company's system of risk management and internal control and to report to shareholders on that review. This encompasses a review of all controls, which the Board has identified as including business, financial, operational, compliance and risk management.

The Directors are responsible for the Company's system of risk management and internal control which is designed to safeguard the Company's assets, maintain proper accounting records and ensure that financial information used within the business, or published, is reliable. However, such a system can only be designed to manage rather than eliminate the risk of failure to achieve business objectives and

therefore can only provide reasonable, but not absolute, assurance against fraud, material misstatement or loss.

Since investment management, custody of assets and all administrative services are provided to the Company by the Manager and its associates, the Company's system of risk management and internal control mainly comprises monitoring the services provided by the Manager and its associates, including the operating controls established by them, to ensure they meet the Company's business objectives.

There is an ongoing process for identifying, evaluating and managing the significant risks faced by the Company (see Principal and Emerging Risks on pages 36 to 40). This process has been in place for the year under review and up to the date of the approval of the annual report and financial statements and it accords with the Financial Reporting Council's guidance.

Given the foregoing, and in common with most investment trust companies, the Company does not have an internal audit function of its own. The Manager's internal audit department conducts regular and rigorous reviews of the various functions within its asset management business. Any significant findings that are relevant to the Company and/or the Manager's investment trust business are reported to the Board.

The key elements designed to provide effective internal control are as follows:

- **Financial Reporting**

Regular and comprehensive review by the Board of key investment and financial data, including management accounts, revenue projections, analysis of transactions and performance comparisons.

- **Management and Depositary Agreements**

Appointment of a manager and depositary regulated by the FCA, whose responsibilities are clearly defined in a written agreement.

- **Management Systems**

The Manager's system of risk management and internal control includes organisational agreements which clearly define the lines of responsibility, delegated authority, control procedures and systems. These are monitored by JPMAM's Compliance department which regularly monitors compliance with FCA rules and reports to the Board.

- **Investment Strategy**

Authorisation and monitoring of the Company's investment strategy and exposure limits by the Board.

The Board, either directly or through the Audit Committee keeps under review the effectiveness of the Company's system of risk management and internal control by monitoring the operation of the key operating controls of the Manager and its associates as follows:

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- the Board, through the Management Engagement Committee and Audit Committee, reviews the terms of the management agreement and receives regular reports from JPMorgan's Compliance department;
- the Board reviews a report, which is also independently reviewed, on the internal controls and the operations of its custodian, JPMorgan Chase Bank;
- the Board reviews every six months a report from the Company's Depositary, Bank of New York Mellon (International) Limited, which summarises the activities performed by the Depositary during the reporting period; and
- the Board reviews every six months an independent report on the internal controls and the operations of JPMF's investment trust department.

The Board has appointed BNYM as Depositary, with responsibilities for safe keeping of custodial assets and oversight of the records and cash flows.

Through the procedures set out above, the Board confirms that it has reviewed the effectiveness of the Company's system of risk management and internal control for the year ended 31st December 2024 and to the date of approval of this Annual Report and Financial Statements.

During the course of its review of the system of risk management and internal control, the Board has not identified nor been advised of any failings or weaknesses which it has determined to be significant. Therefore, a confirmation in respect of necessary actions has not been considered appropriate.

Corporate Governance and Voting Policy

The Company delegates responsibility for voting to JPMAM through the Manager. The following is a summary of JPMAM's policy statements on corporate governance and voting, which has been reviewed and noted by the Board. Details on Environmental, Social and Governance considerations are included in the Strategic Report on pages 18 to 27.

Corporate Governance

We believe that there is a strong positive correlation between high governance standards and superior shareholder returns. Governance is about ensuring the quality of the decision-making process, which can determine the success and failure of the company. Effective corporate governance features transparency, accountability, oversight and respect for shareholders. We evaluate governance starting with a company's board composition, structure and performance, looking for independence, relevant skillsets and board dynamics. Importantly, it is the mandate of a company's board to oversee whether the corporate strategy is aligned with the purpose and value of the company. The board oversees management's execution against the company's

capital, liquidity, strategic and financial operating plans in achieving its set objectives. Capital allocation issues are judged in terms of alignment with long-term strategy and value creation at the applicable company. Boards are also responsible for overseeing the management of financially material environmental and social matters, which could affect the longevity of the company.

Proxy Voting

We vote shares held in our clients' portfolios in a prudent and diligent manner, based on our reasonable judgement of what will best serve the long-term interests of our clients. To help ensure that proxies are voted in the best interests of clients, J.P. Morgan Asset Management has adopted detailed, regional, proxy voting guidelines that incorporate comprehensive guidelines for voting proxies on specific types of issues, and these are publicly available on our websites. We aim to keep abstentions to a minimum. In certain instances, however, it may be in a client's best interests to intentionally refrain from voting.

Stewardship/Engagement

Engaging investee companies in dialogue and encouraging sound environmental, social and governance (ESG) practices is an important component of how we deliver our investment stewardship strategy. Our engagement is based on our in-depth investment research on companies, alongside our assessment of macroeconomic drivers, sector-specific factors and financially material ESG themes. This research insight enables us to act proactively and encourage investee companies to acknowledge issues and improve practices before risks are realised and opportunities are missed. This is how we seek to drive impact in our investment stewardship activity and advocate for sound practices at our investee companies. We believe this will ultimately preserve and enhance asset value.

Our engagement model is built on an investor-led, expert-driven approach and leverages the knowledge of more than 1,000 investment professionals around the world, working in close collaboration with investment stewardship specialists. Our engagement process benefits from the longstanding relationships our investment teams have with local investee companies, through regular interactions with board directors and chairs, senior executives, and CEOs. We believe this collaborative, well-resourced approach enables us to recognise significant risks early and identify new opportunities, supporting our goal of generating attractive risk-adjusted returns. Combining our ESG research capability with the experience and skill of our investment teams and the expertise of our investment stewardship specialists gives us a deep understanding of the risks and opportunities facing different sectors, industries, and geographies. By integrating this expertise into a global common platform, we seek to maintain a consistently high standard of engagement,

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considering the myriad of nuances a responsible investor needs to embrace.

We have identified six Investment Stewardship Priorities that we believe can be broadly applied in our engagement efforts and will remain relevant through market cycles. These priorities address the ESG issues that pose the most significant long-term material financial risks to our investments, while also presenting the greatest opportunities. Engaging on these topics is therefore important to delivering value to our clients:

- *governance;*
- *strategy alignment with the long term;*
- *human capital management;*
- *stakeholder engagement;*
- *climate change; and*
- *natural capital and ecosystems.*

Within each priority area, we have identified related sub-themes that we are seeking to address over a shorter timeframe (18-24 months). These subthemes will evolve, over time, as we engage with investee companies to understand issues and promote best practices. This combination of priorities and evolving themes provides a structured and targeted framework for engagement for our investors and Investment Stewardship team globally.

Audit Committee Report

I am pleased to present the Audit Committee Report for the year ended 31st December 2024.

Composition

The Audit Committee, chaired by Mandy Donald, comprises all of the Directors (except for Dominic Neary who attends by invitation) and meets at least twice each year. In addition, the Audit Committee meets the Auditor at least annually, without any other party present, for a private discussion. The members of the Committee consider that they have the requisite skills and experience to fulfil the responsibilities of the Committee and are satisfied that at least one member (Mandy Donald) of the Audit Committee has recent and relevant financial experience and that the Committee as a whole has competency relevant to the sector in which the Company operates. The constitution and performance of the Audit Committee are reviewed on a regular basis.

Role and Responsibility

The Committee reviews the actions and judgements of the Manager in relation to the Half Year, Annual Report and Financial Statements, formal announcements and the Company's compliance with the AIC Code. It examines the effectiveness of the Company's internal control systems.

It monitors the Company's key risks and controls relating to those risks. It is responsible for reviewing and scrutinising reports from the Depositary and the ISAE/AAF and SSAE16 reports or their equivalent from the Manager, the Custodian and Registrar. It also receives information from the Manager's compliance department and reviews the scope and effectiveness of the external audit, and approves the external Auditor's remuneration and terms of engagement. The Audit Committee reviews the independence and objectivity of the Auditor and is satisfied that the Auditor is independent. The Audit Committee is also responsible for making recommendations to the main Board on the appointment, reappointment and removal of the external Auditor. It is also responsible for reporting any significant financial reporting issues to the Board and for providing review and challenge of key areas of judgement, including any assumptions used, in support of the going concern and Viability statements.

Financial Statements and Significant Accounting Matters

During its review of the Company's financial statements for the year ended 31st December 2024, the Audit Committee considered the following significant issues, including those communicated by the Auditor during their reporting:

Significant issue	How the issue was addressed
Valuation existence and ownership of investments	The valuation of investments is undertaken in accordance with the financial statements policies, disclosed in note 1 to the financial statements on page 80. Discussions have been held with the Manager about the valuation process, existence of the investments and the systems in place for the valuation of the Company's portfolio. The Company has appointed Bank of New York Mellon (International) Limited (BNY) as its depositary. BNY has appointed JPMorgan Chase Bank, N.A., as the Company's custodian. BNY remains responsible for the oversight of the custody of the Company's assets.
Recognition and completeness of investment income	The recognition and completeness of investment income is undertaken in accordance with accounting policy note 1(d) to the financial statements on page 81. The Board reviews the Manager's controls regarding the recognition of income and regularly reviews the Manager's report on the treatment of special dividends and agrees their accounting treatment.
Going Concern/ Long Term Viability	The Committee has reviewed the appropriateness of the adoption of the Going Concern basis in preparing the accounts. The Committee recommended that the adoption of the Going Concern basis is appropriate (see Going Concern statement below). The Committee also assessed the Long Term Viability of the Company as detailed on page 41 and recommended to the Board its expectation that the Company would remain in operation for the five year period of the assessment.
Compliance with Sections 1158 and 1159	Approval for the Company as an investment trust under Sections 1158 and 1159 has been obtained and ongoing compliance with the eligibility criteria is monitored on a regular basis.
Calculation of management fee	The management fee is calculated in accordance with the Investment Management Agreement. The Board reviews the controls reports, expense schedules and the management fees payable to the Manager.
The risk that the global economic disruption and market volatility caused by the war between Ukraine and Russia and more recently the conflict in the Middle East, and geopolitical tensions between USA and China will affect the Company's ability to continue in operation due to the impact on the share price of portfolio companies or the ability of key service providers (including the Manager, the Depositary, the Custodian, the Fund Accountants, the Brokers and the Registrar) to maintain business continuity and continue to provide appropriate service levels.	The Audit Committee has reviewed the impact of market volatility related to the war between Ukraine and Russia and more recently the conflict in the Middle East, tensions between USA and China on the Company's portfolio, and trade wars following the imposition of US tariffs, and receives regular updates on portfolio performance from the portfolio manager. The Audit Committee has also reviewed recent portfolio liquidity and updated revenue and expense forecasts in light of the impact of market volatility on portfolio liquidity, revenue and market valuations and considers that the Company's business model remains viable and that the Company has sufficient resources to continue in operation and to meet all liabilities as they fall due. The Audit Committee has further reviewed the Company's borrowing facility and considers that the Company has continually met its financial covenants in respect of these facilities and has a wide margin before any relevant thresholds are reached. The Audit Committee is confident that the Company has appropriate controls and processes in place to manage the principal risks and uncertainties identified above and to maintain its operating model. The Audit Committee has received representations and updates from the Company's key service providers in respect of their business continuity plans and is confident that all such providers will be able to continue to provide the required level of service for the foreseeable future.

Audit Committee Report

The Board was made fully aware of any significant financial reporting issues and judgements made in connection with the preparation of the financial statements.

Internal Audit

The Committee continues to believe that the Company does not require an internal audit function, as it delegates its day-to-day operations to third parties from whom it receives internal control reports. The Committee considers it sufficient to rely on the internal audit department of the Manager and the Auditor obtains an understanding of the internal controls in place at the Manager by reviewing the relevant internal control reports issued by its independent Auditor.

Going Concern

In accordance with The Financial Reporting Council's guidance on going concern and liquidity risk, the Directors have undertaken a rigorous review of the Company's ability to continue as a going concern. The Directors believe that having considered the Company's investment objective (see page 32), risk management policies (see pages 90 and 94), capital management policies and procedures (see page 94), the nature of the portfolio and expenditure projections, the Company has adequate resources, an appropriate financial structure and suitable management arrangements in place to continue in operational existence to 31st March 2026, being at least 12 months from the date of approval of these financial statements. In particular, the Board has considered the ongoing impact of the war between Ukraine and Russia and more recently the conflict in the Middle East, and the tensions between the USA and China and recent trade wars and believes that this will have a limited financial impact on the Company's operational resources and existence.

The Board is made fully aware of any significant financial reporting issues and judgements made in connection with the preparation of the financial statements. Given the current volatile market conditions, the covenants associated with the Company's gearing facility are calculated and reviewed on a daily basis. All covenants were complied with during the year. The most relevant of these covenants require:

1. that the adjusted asset value of the Company (calculated to exclude certain assets from the Company's total assets) exceed four times the value of the drawn gearing (adjusted asset value of £291.8 million represents 10.8x the value of the drawn gearing of £27.0 million as at 25th March 2025).
2. that the Company's net asset value does not fall below £140.0 million (net asset value of £264.7 million as at 25th March 2025).

The Directors therefore believe that the Company has significant headroom versus its covenants at this time.

The Board has taken into account the fact that the Company has a continuation vote to be considered by shareholders at the Company's 2025 AGM and the likelihood of shareholders voting in favour of continuation, having consulted the Company's major shareholders through the remit of its advisers.

The Company's assets, all of which are investments in quoted securities which are readily realisable, exceed its liabilities under all stress test scenarios reviewed by the Board and reviews of the impact of market factors, structural and financial factors and operating factors. The Company's key third party suppliers, including its Manager, are not experiencing any operational difficulties to adversely affect their services to the Company.

For these reasons, the Directors consider that there is reasonable evidence to continue to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the Financial Statements. They have not identified any material uncertainties in the Company's ability to continue to do so over a period of at least 12 months from the date of approval of these Financial Statements.

The Audit Committee assesses the Company's ability to continue as a going concern to 31st March 2026 and makes recommendations to the Board to approve the going concern concept for preparation of the Financial Statements. The Company's longer-term viability is considered in the Viability Statement on page 41.

Risk Management and Internal Control

The Committee examines the effectiveness of the Company's internal control systems, receives information from the Manager's Compliance department and also reviews the scope and results of the external audit, its cost effectiveness and the independence and objectivity of the external auditor. In the Directors' opinion the Auditor is independent. A risk matrix has been developed which covers all emerging and principal risks the Company faces, the likelihood of their occurrence and their potential impact, how these risks are monitored and mitigating controls in place. The Board has delegated to the Committee the responsibility for the review and maintenance of the risk matrix and the risks are monitored on a regular basis.

The Directors' statement on the Company's system of internal control is set out on page 59.

The Committee has also examined the potential risks posed by climate change to the Company's operations. As a company with no employees or physical offices, the direct risk is negligible. However, there is embedded risk in the Company's investment holdings. The Board receives ESG reports from the Manager on the portfolio and the way financially material ESG considerations are integrated into the investment decisions making process so as to mitigate this risk at the level of stock selection and portfolio construction. Furthermore, since the investments are diversified between sectors, the risk is further mitigated.

As a listed investment trust, the Company is exempt from The Task Force on Climate-Related Financial Disclosures ('TCFD') disclosures; however, in accordance with the requirements of the TCFD, the Investment Manager has provided product level reports for the investment trusts it manages, including the Company. The Investment Manager published its first UK TCFD Report for the Company in respect of the year ended 31st December 2023 on 30th June 2024.

Audit Committee Report

The report discloses the portfolio's climate-related risks and opportunities according to the FCA Environmental, Social and Governance Sourcebook and the TCFD Recommendations. The report is available on the Company's website:

This is the first report under the new guidelines and disclosure requirements and the Board will continue to monitor as these reports evolve.

Auditor Objectivity and Independence

The Committee has implemented safeguards to ensure that the provision of non-audit services does not impair the Auditor's objectivity or independence. All non-audit fees are approved by the Committee prior to engagement. There were no non-audit services provided in the year.

Effectiveness of Audit

The Committee reviewed the audit planning, scope of the audit plan, materiality level and the standing, skills and experience of the firm and the audit team. The Committee also considered the independence of BDO LLP ('BDO') and the objectivity of the audit process. BDO has confirmed that it is independent of the Company and has complied with relevant auditing standards. No modifications were required to the external audit approach. The Committee received a presentation of the audit plan from BDO prior to the commencement of the 2024 audit and a presentation of the results of the audit following completion of the main audit testing. Additionally, the Committee received feedback from the Manager regarding the effectiveness of the external audit process.

The Committee considers the audit fee and whether the audit provides value and effectiveness. Details of the Auditor's fees paid for audit services are disclosed in note 6 on page 83.

Auditor Appointment and Tenure

The Audit Committee has the primary responsibility for making recommendations to the Board on the reappointment and the removal of the external auditor.

Regulations currently in force require the Company to conduct a tender at least every ten years and rotate auditors at least every 20 years. BDO LLP was appointed as the Company's Auditor with effect from 19th August 2020. The audit engagement partner rotates at least every five years in accordance with ethical guidelines and this is the fifth year for the current partner. The Committee acknowledges that rotating the audit partner provides a fresh perspective on the audit responsibilities for the Company. This year ended 31st December 2024 is the current partner's fifth year of a five year maximum term and therefore a new audit partner will be introduced following the 2024 audit.

In July 2024 the FRC published its annual assessment of quality among the Tier 11 audit firms. Our external auditor, BDO is one of the six Tier 11 audit firms, and was therefore subject to a review by the Financial Reporting Council's Audit Quality Review team. The FRC's report identified a number of areas for improvement for BDO, and in response to these findings, BDO has implemented an action plan. The Audit

Committee discussed the FRC's findings along with BDO's action plan in detail with BDO. BDO have confirmed that they remain committed to maintaining the highest standards of audit quality and will continue to work closely with the FRC to address any areas of concern.

Representatives of the Company's Auditor attended the Audit Committee meeting at which the draft Annual Report and Financial Statements were considered and also engage with Directors as and when required. Having reviewed the performance of the external Auditor, including assessing the quality of work, timing of communications and work with the Manager, the Committee considered it appropriate to recommend their reappointment. The Board supported this recommendation which will be put to shareholders at the forthcoming Annual General Meeting. BDO has confirmed its willingness to continue in office. The Board reviews and approves any non-audit services provided by the independent auditors and assesses the impact of any non-audit work on the ability of the auditors to remain independent. No non-audit work was carried out by the Auditor this year.

The Committee confirms that the Company is in compliance with the requirements of the Statutory Audit Services for Large Companies Market Investigation (Mandatory Use of Competitive Tender Processes and Audit Committee Responsibilities) Order 2014. This order relates to the frequency and governance of tenders for the appointment of the auditor and the setting of the policy on the provision of non-audit services.

Committee Evaluation

The activities of the Committee were considered as part of the externally facilitated Board evaluation process. The evaluation found that the Committee functioned well, with the appropriate balance of membership, skills and challenge.

Fair, Balanced and Understandable

Having taken all available information into consideration and having discussed the content of the Annual Report and Financial Statements with the AIFM, the Investment Manager, the Company Secretary and other third party service providers, the Committee has concluded that the Annual Report and Financial Statements for the year ended 31st December 2024, taken as a whole, is fair, balanced and understandable and provides the information necessary for shareholders to assess the Company's position and performance, business model and strategy, and has reported on these findings to the Board. The Board's conclusions in this respect are set out in the Statement of Directors' Responsibilities on page 67.

Directors' Remuneration Report

Statement from the Chair

I am pleased to present the Directors' Remuneration Report for the year ended 31st December 2024, which has been prepared in accordance with the requirements of Section 421 of the Companies Act 2006 as amended.

The law requires the Company's auditor to audit certain of the disclosures provided. Where disclosures have been audited, they are indicated as such. The Auditor's opinion is included in their report on page 69.

All of the Directors are non-executive. We have therefore not reported on those aspects of remuneration that relate to executive directors. In 2018 the Board established a Remuneration Committee. This Committee considers the level of Directors' fees annually and makes recommendations to the Board.

Directors' Remuneration Policy

The law requires that the Directors' Remuneration Policy Report is subject to a triennial binding vote. However, the Board has resolved that for good governance purposes, the policy will be put to shareholders every year. Accordingly, a resolution to approve this policy will be put to shareholders at the forthcoming Annual General Meeting. The policy subject to the vote, is set out in full below and is currently in force.

The Board's policy for this and subsequent years is that Directors' fees should properly reflect the time spent by the Directors on the Company's business and should be at a level to ensure that candidates of a high calibre are recruited to the Board. The Chair of the Board, the Chair of the Audit Committee and the Senior Independent Director are paid higher fees than other Directors, reflecting the greater time commitment involved in fulfilling those roles.

The Remuneration Committee, comprising all Directors, reviews Directors' fees on a regular basis and makes recommendations to the Board as and when appropriate. Reviews are based on information provided by the Manager, and includes research carried out by third parties on the level of fees paid to the directors of the Company's peers and within the investment trust industry generally. The involvement of remuneration consultants has not been deemed necessary as part of this review.

All of the Directors are non-executive. There are no performance-related elements to their fees and the Company does not operate any type of incentive, share scheme, award or pension scheme and therefore no Directors receive bonus payments or pension contributions from the Company or hold options to acquire shares in the Company. Directors are not granted exit payments and are not provided with compensation for loss of office. No other payments are paid to Directors, other than the reimbursement of reasonable out-of-pocket expenses incurred in attending the Company's business.

During the year under review, Directors' fees were paid at the following rates: £43,000 per annum for the Chair; £36,250 per annum for the Chair of the Audit Committee; £32,500 per annum for the Senior Independent Director; and £30,500 per annum for each other Directors. In January 2025, the Board agreed with the recommendation of the Remuneration Committee that, commencing 1st January 2025, the Directors' fees be increased to the following rates: £45,000 per annum for the Chair; £38,000 per annum for the Audit Committee Chair; £34,000 per annum for the Senior Independent Director; and £32,000 per annum for each of the other Directors.

Fees for any new Director appointed will be made on the above basis. The Company's existing Articles of Association stipulate that aggregate Directors' fees must not exceed £250,000 per annum. Any increase in this the maximum aggregate amount requires both Board and shareholder approval. The total amount of Directors' fees paid in the year under review was £151,719.

The Company has no Chief Executive Officer and no employees and therefore there was no consultation with employees, and there is no employee comparative data to provide, in relation to the setting of the remuneration policy for Directors.

During the year, the Board did not seek shareholder views on the Company's remuneration policy. However, the policy is subject to shareholder approval at the AGM. The Remuneration Committee considers any comments received from shareholders on remuneration policy on an ongoing basis and will take account of these views if appropriate. It has not received any views from shareholders in respect of the levels of Directors' remuneration during the financial year.

The Directors do not have service contracts with the Company. The terms and conditions of Directors' appointments are set out in formal letters of appointment which are available for review at the Company's Annual General Meeting and the Company's registered office. Details of the Board's policy on tenure are set out on page 53.

Directors' Remuneration Policy Implementation

The Directors' Remuneration Policy Implementation Report, which includes details of the Directors' remuneration policy and its implementation, is subject to an annual advisory vote and therefore an ordinary resolution to approve this report will be put to shareholders at the forthcoming Annual General Meeting. There have been no changes to the policy compared with the year ended 31st December 2023 and no changes are proposed for the year ending 31st December 2025.

Voting at the Annual General Meeting

The Directors' Remuneration Policy and Remuneration Report for the year ended 31st December 2023 were approved by shareholders at the Annual General Meeting held on 22nd April 2024.

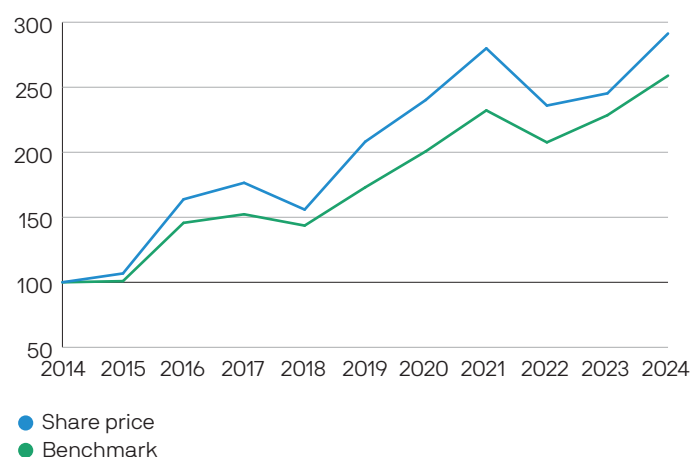

Conclusions relating to going concern

In auditing the financial statements, we have concluded that the Directors' use of the going concern basis of accounting in the preparation of the financial statements is appropriate. Our evaluation of the Directors' assessment of the Company's ability to continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting included:

For these reasons and the materiality of the balance in relation to the financial statements as a whole, we considered this to be a key audit matter. We responded to this matter by testing the valuation and ownership of the whole portfolio of quoted investments. We performed the following procedures: ● Confirmed the year-end bid price was used by agreeing to externally quoted prices; ● Assessed if there were contra indicators, such as liquidity considerations, to suggest bid price is not the most appropriate indication of fair value by considering the realisation period for individual holdings; ● Recalculated the valuation by multiplying the number of shares held per the statement obtained from the custodian by the valuation per share; and ● Obtained direct confirmation of the number of shares held per equity investment from the custodian regarding all investments held at the balance sheet date. We also considered the completeness, accuracy and clarity of investment-related disclosures against the requirements of relevant accounting standard. Key observations: Based on our procedures performed we did not identify any matters to suggest the valuation or ownership of the quoted equity investments was not appropriate.

Our application of materiality

We apply the concept of materiality both in planning and performing our audit, and in evaluating the effect of misstatements. Notes to the Financial Statements

For the year ended 31st December 2024

1. Accounting policies

(a) General information and basis of accounting

The financial statements are prepared under the historical cost convention, modified to include fixed asset investments at fair value, and in accordance with the Companies Act 2006, United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice (UK GAAP), including 'the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' (FRS 102) and with the Statement of Recommended Practice 'Financial Statements of Investment Trust Companies and Venture Capital Trusts' (the 'SORP') issued by the Association of Investment Companies in July 2022.

All of the Company's operations are of a continuing nature.

The Directors believe that having considered the Company's investment objective (see page 32), risk management policies (see pages 55 and 56), capital management policies and procedures (see page 94), the nature of the portfolio and expenditure projections, the Company has adequate resources, an appropriate financial structure and suitable management arrangements in place to continue in operational existence up to 31st March 2026 which is at least 12 months from the date of approval of these financial statements. In particular, the Board has considered the ongoing impact of the war between Ukraine and Russia and more recently the conflict in the Middle East, and the tensions between the USA and China and believes that this will have a limited financial impact on the Company's operational resources and existence. The Directors have a reasonable expectation that the Company's shareholders will vote in favour of continuation at the AGM in 2025. Furthermore, the Company has in place a US\$35 million (with a US\$5 million accordion option) loan facility, renewed on 14th March 2025. For these reasons, the Directors consider it appropriate to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the Company's financial statements. They have not identified any material uncertainties to the Company's ability to continue as a going concern.

The policies applied in these financial statements are consistent with those applied in the preceding year.

(b) Valuation of investments

The Company has adopted Sections 11 and 12 of FRS 102 in respect of financial instruments.

The Company's business is investing in financial assets with a view to profiting from their total return in the form of income and capital growth. The portfolio of financial assets is managed and its performance evaluated on a fair value basis, in accordance with a documented investment strategy and information is provided internally on that basis to the Company's Board of Directors.

Upon initial recognition the investments are treated by the Company as 'held at fair value through profit or loss'. They are included initially at fair value which is taken to be their cost, excluding expenses incidental to purchase which are written off to capital at the time of acquisition. Subsequently the investments are valued at fair value, which are quoted bid prices for investments traded in active markets. For investments which are not traded in active markets, unlisted and restricted investments, the Board takes into account the latest traded prices, other observable market data and asset values based on the latest management accounts.

(c) Accounting for reserves

Capital reserve – realised gains and losses

Gains and losses on sales of investments including the related foreign exchange gains and losses, realised exchange gains and losses on foreign currency, management fee and finance costs allocated to capital and any other capital charges, are included in the Statement of Comprehensive Income and dealt with in the capital reserve 'Gains and losses on sales of investments'.

Capital reserve – investment holding gains and losses

Increases and decreases in the valuation of investments held at the year end including the related foreign exchange gains and losses, unrealised gains and losses on forward foreign currency contracts, are included in the Statement of Comprehensive Income and dealt with in the capital reserve 'Investment holding gains and losses'.

Share premium

Amounts received in excess of the par value of issued shares are held in Share premium. For shares that have been reissued from Treasury, the excess amount of the sales proceeds over the purchase price of those shares, will be transferred to share premium.

Notes to the Financial Statements

Capital redemption reserve

Par value of shares repurchased and cancelled by the Company are transferred from Called up share capital to the Capital redemption reserve.

Revenue reserve

Net revenue return after taxation for the year is accounted for in the Revenue reserve.

(d) Income

Dividends receivable from equity shares are included in revenue on an ex-dividend basis except where, in the opinion of the Board, the dividend is capital in nature, in which case it is included in capital.

Overseas dividends are included gross of any withholding tax.

Special dividends are looked at individually to ascertain the reason behind the payment. This will determine whether they are treated as revenue or capital.

Where the Company has elected to receive scrip dividends in the form of additional shares rather than in cash, the amount of the cash dividend foregone is recognised in revenue. Any excess in the value of the shares received over the amount of the cash dividend is recognised in capital.

Deposit interest receivable is taken to revenue on an accruals basis.

(e) Expenses

All expenses are accounted for on an accruals basis. Expenses are allocated wholly to the revenue with the following exceptions:

- the management fee is allocated 20% to revenue and 80% to capital, in line with the Board's expected long term split of revenue and capital return from the Company's investment portfolio.
- expenses incidental to the purchase and sale of an investment are charged to capital. These expenses are commonly referred to as transaction costs and comprise brokerage commission and stamp duty. Details of transaction costs are given in note 11 on page 86.

(f) Finance costs

Finance costs are accounted for on an accruals basis using the effective interest method.

Finance costs are allocated 20% to revenue and 80% to capital, in line with the Board's expected long term split of revenue and capital return from the Company's investment portfolio.

(g) Financial instruments

Cash at bank may comprise cash including demand deposits which are short term. Current asset investments will include highly liquid investments that are readily convertible to a known amount of cash and are subject to an insignificant risk of change in value.

The Company invests in JPMorgan Liquidity funds, money market funds, which are considered current asset investments or cash equivalent as they are held for short term cash management purposes, as an alternative to cash, which are readily realisable to a known amount of cash with low volatility NAV.

Bank loans are classified as financial liabilities at amortised cost. They are initially measured at proceeds net of direct issue costs and subsequently measured at amortised cost. Interest payable on bank loans is accounted for on an accruals basis in the Statement of Comprehensive Income. The amortisation of direct issue costs are accounted for on an accruals basis in the Statement of Comprehensive Income using the effective interest method.

Other debtors and creditors do not carry any interest, are short term in nature and are accordingly stated at nominal value, with debtors reduced by appropriate allowances for estimated irrecoverable amounts.

(h) Taxation

Approved investment trusts are exempt from tax on capital gains made within the company.

Current tax is provided at the amounts expected to be paid or recovered.

Deferred tax is provided on all timing differences that have originated but not reversed by the balance sheet date. Deferred tax liabilities are recognised for all taxable timing differences but deferred tax assets are only recognised to the extent that it is more likely than not that taxable profits will be available against which those timing differences can be utilised.

Notes to the Financial Statements

1. Accounting policies (continued)

(h) Taxation (continued)

Tax relief is allocated to expenses charged to capital on the 'marginal basis'. On this basis, if taxable income is capable of being entirely offset by revenue expenses, then no tax relief is transferred to the capital column.

Deferred tax is measured at the tax rate which is expected to apply in the periods in which the timing differences are expected to reverse, based on tax rates that have been enacted or substantively enacted at the balance sheet date and is measured on an undiscounted basis.

(i) Value Added Tax ('VAT')

Withholding tax is recognised as a revenue expense, if it is not recoverable.

Expenses are disclosed inclusive of the related irrecoverable VAT. Recoverable VAT is calculated using the partial exemption method based on the proportion of zero rated supplies to total supplies.

(j) Functional currency

The Company is required to identify its functional currency, being the currency of the primary economic environment in which the Company operates.

The Board, having regard to the currency of the Company's share capital and the predominant currency in which its shareholders operate, has determined that sterling is the functional currency. Sterling is also the currency in which the financial statements are presented.

Transactions denominated in foreign currencies are converted at actual exchange rates at the date of the transaction.

Monetary assets and liabilities and equity investments held at fair value denominated in foreign currencies at the year end are translated at the rates of exchange prevailing at the year end.

Any gain or loss arising from a change in exchange rates subsequent to the date of the transaction is included as an exchange gain or loss in revenue or capital, depending on whether the gain or loss is of a revenue or capital nature.

(k) Dividends payable

Dividends are included in the financial statements in the year in which they are approved by shareholders.

(l) Repurchase of shares into Treasury

The cost of repurchasing shares into Treasury, including the related stamp duty and transaction costs is charged to capital reserves and recognised in the Statement of Changes in Equity. Share repurchase transactions are accounted for on a trade date basis. Where shares held in Treasury are subsequently cancelled, the nominal value of those shares is transferred out of called up share capital and into capital redemption reserve.

(m) Issuance of new Ordinary shares

The nominal value of new Ordinary shares is included under Called Up Share Capital. Any amount in excess of the nominal value is included under Share Premium.

For shares re-issued from Treasury the sales proceeds will be treated as a realised profit up to the amount of the purchase price of those shares and will be transferred to realised capital reserves. The excess of the sales (issue) proceeds over the purchase price will be transferred to share premium.

2. Significant accounting judgements, estimates and assumptions

The preparation of the Company's financial statements on occasion requires the Directors to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts in the primary financial statements and the accompanying disclosures. These assumptions and estimates could result in outcomes that require a material adjustment to the carrying amount of assets or liabilities affected in the current and future periods, depending on circumstance.

The Company holds mainly US dollar denominated investments. However, the Company's shareholders are predominantly based in the United Kingdom and the majority of its expenditure is in Sterling. Therefore, the Directors believe that it is appropriate for the Company's presentational and functional currency to be Sterling.

Apart from the functional currency, the Directors do not believe that any significant accounting judgements or estimates have been applied to this set of financial statements, that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amount of assets and liabilities within the next financial year.

The Company has an unrecognised deferred tax asset of £10,929,000 (2023: £10,255,000) in respect of cumulative excess management expenses and loan relationships totalling £43,735,000 (2023: £40,866,000). This is based on a prospective corporation tax rate of 25% (2023: 25%) as enacted by the Finance Act 2021. The deferred tax asset has arisen due to the cumulative excess of deductible expenses over taxable income. On 29th October 2021, the Company renewed its US\$30 million revolving loan facility with The Bank of Nova Scotia, London Branch (new entity of the previous Scotiabank) for a further two years. Under the terms of this agreement, the Company could draw down up to US\$30 million loan facility (with an accordion facility of an additional US\$10 million), at an interest rate of

compounded SOFR (Secured Overnight Financing Rate) (in respect of Dollar denominated loans), as offered in the market for the relevant currency and loan period, plus a margin of 0.9% (Dollar denominated loans) and plus 'Mandatory Costs', which are the lender's costs of complying with certain regulatory requirements of the Bank of England and the Financial Conduct Authority.

The Company's multicurrency revolving unsecured loan facility with Scotiabank was due to be renewed on 27th October 2023. However, the facility was extended to 15th March 2024 to allow time to finalise the loan renewal documentation, the delay being caused by the move from unsecured to secured. On 15th March 2024 the Board renewed the facility with Scotiabank, the new facility being a secured 364 day facility for a reduced amount of US\$20 million (plus an accordion facility of an additional US\$10 million) at an interest rate of compounded SOFR plus a margin of 1.05% (Dollar denominated loans). The Company then elected to utilise the US\$10 million accordion facility in Nov 2024, taking the total commitment to US\$30 million.

Following the year-end, on 14th March 2025 the Company renewed its loan facility with a new loan provider, Bank of America. Under the terms of this current agreement, the Company may draw down up to US\$40 million loan facility (including an accordion facility of US\$5 million), at an interest rate of compounded SOFR plus a margin of 1.00% (Dollar denominated loans). The new facility is a 360 day evergreen facility.

Commitment fees are also payable on the facility. The facility is subject to the following covenants and restrictions:

- The Company's adjusted asset coverage must not fall below 4:1;
- The Company's net asset value must not be less than £140 million; and
- The Company's maximum borrowing limit cannot be exceeded at any time.

These covenants and restrictions are customary for a credit facility of this nature. All of the covenants and restrictions have been met during the year and continue to be met.

As at 31st December 2024, the Company had drawn down US\$30.0 million (£24.0 million) on this facility.

20. Financial instruments' exposure to risk and risk management policies

As an investment trust, the Company invests in equities and other securities for the long term so as to secure its investment objective stated on the 'Features' page. In pursuing this objective, the Company is exposed to a variety of financial risks that could result in a reduction in the Company's net assets or a reduction in the profits available for dividends.

These financial risks include market risk (comprising currency risk, interest rate risk and other price risk), liquidity risk and credit risk. The Directors' policy for managing these risks is set out below.

The objectives, policies and processes for managing the risks and the methods used to measure the risks that are set out below, have not changed from those applying in the comparative year.

The Company's classes of financial instruments are as follows:

- investments in US equity shares, which are held in accordance with the Company's investment objective;
- cash held within a liquidity fund;
- short term debtors, creditors and cash arising directly from its operations; and
- bank loans and overdrafts, the purpose of which is to finance the Company's operations.

(a) Market risk

The fair value or future cash flows of a financial instrument held by the Company may fluctuate because of changes in market prices. This market risk comprises three elements – currency risk, interest rate risk and other price risk. Information to enable an evaluation of the nature and extent of these three elements of market risk is given in parts (i) and (iii) of this note, together with sensitivity analysis where appropriate. The Board reviews and agrees policies for managing these risks and these policies have remained unchanged from those applying in the comparative year. The Manager assesses the exposure to market risk when making each investment decision and monitors the overall level of market risk on the whole of the investment portfolio on an ongoing basis.

(i) Currency risk

The majority of the Company's assets and income are denominated in currencies other than sterling which is the Company's functional currency and the currency in which it reports. As a result, movements in exchange rates will affect the sterling value of those items.

Management of currency risk

The Manager monitors the Company's exposure to foreign currencies on a daily basis and reports to the Board, which meets on at least six occasions each year. The Manager measures the risk to the Company of the foreign currency exposure by considering the effect on the Company's net asset value and income of a movement in the rates of exchange to which the Company's assets, liabilities, income and expenses are exposed. Foreign currency borrowing may be used to limit the Company's exposure to anticipated changes in exchange rates which might otherwise adversely affect the value of the portfolio of investments. This borrowing is limited to currencies and amounts commensurate with the asset exposure to those currencies. Income denominated in foreign currencies is converted to sterling on receipt. The Company may use short term forward currency contracts to manage working capital requirements. No such contracts were used during the year.

Information About the Company

Financial Conduct Authority ('FCA') Regulation of 'non-mainstream pooled investments', MiFID II 'complex investments'

The Company currently conducts its affairs so that the shares issued by the Company can be recommended by independent financial advisers to ordinary retail investors in accordance with the FCA's rules in relation to non-mainstream investment products and intends to continue to do so for the foreseeable future. The shares are excluded from the FCA's restrictions which apply to non-mainstream investment products because they are shares in an investment trust. Gearing

The Company has a secured US\$35 million borrowing facility (with a US\$5 million accordion option) in place, which is available for the Portfolio Managers to utilise within guidelines set by the Board. History

JPMorgan US Smaller Companies Investment Trust plc was incorporated in 1955 as Atomic Securities Trust Limited. It was dormant until 1962 when it changed its name to Fledgeling Investments Limited and began operations as an unquoted investment company.

The trust was wholly owned by a number of Fleming investment trusts and invested in listed and unlisted companies in the UK and US which for reasons of small size, illiquidity or risk, were unsuitable for direct investment. In 1982, with assets of £9.2 million, it obtained a listing on the London Stock Exchange and gained investment trust status. At that time it changed its name to The Fleming Fledgeling Investment Trust plc and gradually broadened its investment scope into Europe and the Asian markets. In April 1998, the Company changed its name to The Fleming US Discovery Investment Trust plc and then again to JPMorgan Fleming US Discovery Investment Trust plc in May 2002. The Company adopted its present name in April 2010.
